HURON RIFLEMEN DID SOME FINE SHOOTING

Colborne Team Won Back the League Trophy in a Very Keen Contest.

Dungannon, June 17.—The fourth annual tournament of the Huron County Rifle League was held at Point Farm and was marked by phenomenal shooting by the celebrated marksmen of West Huron. There were in all 150 competitors for nearly \$100 worth of individual prizes, and 11 teams from nine associations contested for team trophies. Except for a slight wind, the weather conditions were ideal, adding to the success of the event. Shooting was conducted at 200 yards and 500 yards with double targets at each range. A new firing ticket system was in vogue and gave entire satisfaction.

The contest for the league trophy was principally between the old rival teams, Colborne and Dungannon. The Colborne team, since losing it three years ago, have tried hard to regain it and were not successful until yesterday, when they won it after a keen contest with Dungannon and St. Helens. The winners did remarkably well, their average being for the ten men, 62.3 out of 70. Dungannon team No. 3, Palmer, 68 out of 70, Lewis, 68, their average being over 60.

Individual scoring was also very high. The league medal was won by 70. Lochish, with a score of 68 out of 70. As an indication of the high scores made, two scores of 60 were counted out after fifty prizes had been awarded. Three possibilities were made during the day. W. Reid of Dungannon, making 60, Colborne, 62; Dungannon, 60; St. Helens, 60; 1. 60; 2. 58; St. Augustine, 57; Whitechurch, 57; Auburn, 56; Larknave, 55; St. Helens, No. 2, 54; Kintail, 52.

A fifteen-year-old boy belonging to the Dungannon R. A. scored 65 out of 70, and scored seventh place in the list of prize winners.

DOUBLE ELECTROCUTION

Two Murderers of Rochester Grocer Sent to Electric Chair.

Auburn, N. Y., June 18.—The second double electrocution in the history of Auburn prison took place this morning when Ralph Friedman and Jacob Kuhn, the Rochester burglars, who murdered George A. Schuchart, a grocer, were put to death.

Friedman, who was sentenced to the chair first without losing the remarkable nerve that has sustained him from the moment of his conviction, when he exclaimed: "I will go to the chair with a smile on my face. They won't see me flinch." The

smile was absent, but calm resignation and mild interest in the final adjustment of the electrodes marked his departure.

Kuhn, who had lost his nerve during the past few days, and had insisted that his execution would be an injustice, because he did not fire the revolver that killed Schuchart, changed his demeanor during the final hours and went to his death smiling.

"Is that the only thing?"

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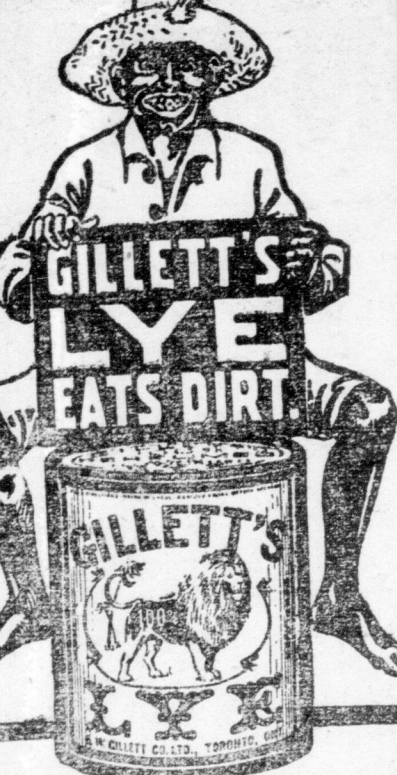
