BOMB EXPLODED Suffragettes Blamed For Stir at Liverpool—Others Think Explosion a Joke. J. McQUAKER FOR N. GREY

Unanimous Choice of Liberals at Enthusiastic Owen Sound Convention.

FINE TEMPERANCE MAN Owen Sound, June 11.—John McQuaker, of Owen Sound, was named as Liberal candidate for North Grey at an enthusiastic convention here today.

Mr. McQuaker was the only nominee, and was promised unanimous support. Mr. McQuaker, when he rose to reply, was greeted with a storm of cheers and applause. He thanked the convention for the honor accorded him and felt it the more meaningful as he had not solicited the support of a single delegate. If elected he would do all he could to forward those principles as at present set out in the Rowell platform. "But," said Mr. McQuaker, "I will always reserve to myself if elected, the privilege of supporting any legislation no matter from which party it may emanate."

This expression of independence again met the delegates applauding lustily. Mr. McQuaker is a commission merchant, and the owner of a large creamery. He is an active temperance man.

Mr. J. M. Kilbourn moved the vote of confidence in the Opposition policy and the leadership of Mr. N. Rowell, and this was enthusiastically assented to by every delegate.

The resolution offered by Mr. F. W. Harrison expressing confidence in the Opposition at Ottawa, and condemning the "facing-two-ways" policy of the present Government also carried amid enthusiasm.

A rousing address by Mr. Marshall, M. P. P. for Monck, brought the meeting to a close.
