William A. Colledge, Editor of Encyclopedia, Lectures in Auditorium.

The Toronto Star has the following regarding Prof. Adam Shortt:

To the Canadian Club on Monday comes Adam Shortt from Kilworth Bridge. You will not find Kilworth Bridge recorded in any railroad guide nor on any but detailed maps of the County of Middlesex. There is no railway brave enough to confess its name. Only the Canadian Almanac and the Postal Guide list it—and among the named places of the earth. One does not meet in a week's journeying many people from the hamlet of Kilworth, but when Adam Shortt entered the scholastic, and public service life of Canada, he made up for whatever obscurity might otherwise be attributed to his birthplace. Adam Shortt, of Kilworth Bridge, is either professor, or president, or Doctor Shortt, whichever you may choose to call him. And Ottawa at present lays claim to his name in its telephone book. But from Kilworth Bridge, out of the world's common line of vision, dreaming among fields, Adam Shortt, literateur, historian, publicist, educationist, and public servant, made his march and his conquest. Kilworth Bridge is no obscure place, but the name of this one man.

Dared To Defend Combines. Professor Adam Shortt is possibly the only Canadian who, without being financially interested, has dared to defend trusts and combines, and who has even gone so far as to declare them not only good, but necessary, needing only proper control to be of great service to the state and to humanity. He has often expressed this opinion in private life and to his students and in semi-public places, but last February he enunciated this policy before the old age pensions committee of the House of Commons at Ottawa, and not only confessed the belief, but backed it with reasons, and with the weight of his own name as—among other things—an eminent economist and a man of character.

Professor Adam Shortt is an exception to the rule that great academic, and public service life of Canada, presidents come from the Maritime Provinces. He was born at the small Ontario village before referred to, in 1859—he is fifty-four years old on the 24th of this month. His parents were of Scotch descent. From them it is perhaps that he inherited a love of learning and a thoughtfulness which carried him through the local school-masters' exercises in triumph and landed him first at the Walkerton high school and then at the University of Toronto. At the age of 24 he had his B. A. from that institution. At twenty-five he had his M. A. From that time on his rise was steady. The year after he took his M. A. he became

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assistant professor of philosophy at Queen's University.

Won New Honors. In four years he became lecturer in political science for Queen's, and in three more years he succeeded to the chair, holding it until 1908—sixteen years—when he was appointed chairman of the civil service commission at Ottawa.

Meantime, of course, he had had other honors. As the result of post-graduate work in Glasgow and Edinburgh, he obtained the degree of LL.D. He was a member of the Ontario railway taxation commission in 1904, chairman of the C. P. R. engineers' and machinists' board of conciliation in 1907, member of the Canadian historical manuscript commission of 1907, trustee of Queen's University in 1908, vice-president of the Ottawa Archaeological Society, president of the Ottawa branch of the Social and Moral Reform Association, and finally was appointed president of the new University of British Columbia, which is not yet fully organized. He has done a great deal of historical research work and economic research work. He has published, for example, such works as "Imperial Preferential Trade From the Canadian Point of View," "Documents Relating to the Constitutional History of Canada, 1759-61," and the "Life of Lord Sydenham," which was brought out as one of the "Makers of Canada" series.

Raised Scholarship Standard. Professor Shortt's best-known work, and that which has had the most direct effect perhaps, was in connection with the civil service commission. His reputation as a student and unbiased observer was such that

his connection with the commission was virtually a guarantee that so far as its scope went it might thereafter be relied upon to counteract the "pull" evil and put the service on its merits, as it were. In addition to this Professor Shortt threw his influence toward the raising of the general scholarship standard in the service. He went upon the theory that the civil service must not be made a mere refuge for men who could not or would not make a success in any other line of work. Partly to keep out that type and partly because he felt that the country should command the best class of service, he kept the educational standards comparatively high. This has had a remarkably good effect upon the whole service at Ottawa.

Outside of this and the other activities of this interesting Canadian there is also the fact that Professor Shortt, by his personal qualities, is able to impart his ideas to men in high places, such ideas bearing fruit without betraying sometimes their originator. Professor Shortt had more than a little to do, it is said, respecting the Lemieux act and the act to regulate combinations in restraint of trade.

**DR. ADAM SHORTT
IS THE BOAST OF
KILWORTH BRIDGE**

Great Canadian Economist and Public Servant Came From Down the River.

IS A DISTINGUISHED MAN

He Is To Be President of British Columbia's University Very Shortly.

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
