"You will appreciate," says the letter of protest, the serious consequences that this growing practice must have upon the quality of the American cotton crop, thereby effectually reducing its monetary value." Secretary Houston is urged to make

representations to the cotton exchanges of the south, asking them to inform the ginners of the necessity of keeping different seed cottons of various staples separate and not to gin different qualities together. At the department it was pointed out

that the trouble is due largely to the disinclination of the American ginner to take the time after ginning one kind of cotton to clean out the ginning achine before he introduces another staple. It was stated that the value of a bale is often lessened from \$1.50 to
