KIWANIS DECIDE TO ADOPT 15 MORE BOYS

London Members Evince Keen

Interest in Welfare Work.

As a preliminary move toward making child welfare work a big objective for all the Kiwanis clubs of the district, the London members of that body at their weekly luncheon Friday voted unanimously to increase the number of boys under their care from 34 to 50. Local delegates to the district convention in Montreal next October will be further instructed to press before that gathering a motion that such undertaking will become the definite feature of all the clubs of the district.

Cites Sad Instances.
Although the London members have always evinced keen interest in work of this nature, and are at this moment looking after the several needs of a substantial number of youngsters whose fathers paid the supreme sacrifice overseas, the address at yesterday's meeting by Hugh Murray undoubtedly aroused in them renewed enthusiasm of the highest order. Reviewing the work of the committee up to the present, Mr. Murray recited a number of instances that were sad indeed, emphasizing the opportunity for the members to increase their activities. He explained that with the adoption of these additional 15 boys the expenses for the year would be approximately \$2,250. That little or no difficulty will be encountered in meeting this sum is anticipated.

Wilfred Hodgins, chairman of the ways and means committee, whose subject will be the raising of this amount, explained that it was proposed that the members put on a minstrel show, the proceeds from which would no doubt be considerable.

Lauds Effort.
A. E. Barber, president of the Children's Aid Society and a guest of the club at luncheon, spoke briefly lauding the efforts of the Kiwanis in this particular endeavor. "In place of building jails in the future," he said, "you will be building homes. Your work is a grand effort and no amount of it can be termed too much. Good boys and girls are the greatest asset to any country."

J. B. Hay, chairman of the day, also urged that the members all put energy into the movement.

Acting upon his advice it was proposed with favorable results that two boys in particular be taken over by the club for adoption. He explained that these lads Thursday suffered the unfortunate experience of getting on a L. and P. S. train at the power house in place of the station and were accordingly assessed the regular fare. RECOMMEND THAT SERVICES OF TOWN PLANNER BE SECURED

Thomas Adams, Dominion Official Is Man Selected by Committee.

That Thomas Adams of Ottawa, Dominion town-planner, be engaged by the city council as consultant for the city of London in preparation for extensive town-planning, was the recommendation adopted by members of the town planning commission in session here Friday afternoon. Mr. Adams, who was present at this meeting in the Tecumseh Hotel, informed the commission that his services could be engaged in this capacity by the city.

He will remain here for two days in consultation with City Engineer H. A. Brazier, with whom he will co-operate if the city council favors the commission's recommendation. Planning for the entire city for a definite future is the object of the commission, with plans maturing over a period of two years.

Such planning will include zoning, with protection to certain areas, while others are set aside for industrial purposes. Special pavements and drainage facilities will be planned to suit each district. The work will not be of a destructive type, but will improve present conditions.

For this purpose maps of the city will be prepared by the city engineer's department. Mr. Adams acting as consultant. All members of the commission were present at the meeting, excepting Ald. Cameron Wilson and Major J. Murphy, the chairman, who are out of the city. In the chairman's absence, Ald. E. Harley presided at the meeting, which took the form of an informal discussion, with Mr. Adams as adviser.

CAPITAL GIVES NEW GOVERNOR FINE WELCOME

Gay Scene On Parliament Hill As Lord Byng Arrives.

STREETS GAY WITH FLAGS

State Carriage Was Escorted by Detachment of Mounted Police.

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—(By Canadian Press.)—Residents of the capital welcomed Lord Byng of Vimy a warm welcome when he arrived with Her Excellency Lady Byng and suite at 2:15 o'clock this afternoon. During the reception the skies had presented a leaden appearance and there were threats of rain, but shortly after noon the sun broke through the clouds and crowds of citizens who previously had been hesitating over the dangers of getting wet, made their way to the station and to Parliament Hill, where receptions had been arranged.

Premier Was There.
At the station Lord Byng was greeted by the prime minister and other members of the cabinet; at Parliament Hill the reception was in the hands of the civic authorities and addresses were presented by Mayor F. H. Plant, on behalf of the citizens of Ottawa and by R. R. Maxwell, president of the Great War Veterans' Association, on behalf of the veterans in Canada, and replied to by Lord Byng.

A crowd of upwards of twenty thousand covered the lawns in front of the new parliament buildings, while on a platform erected on the steps leading up from the main walk to the buildings were representatives of the Dominion Government, civic officials, officers in army, navy and air force uniforms and many handsomely gowned ladies, including Mrs. Meighen, wife of Premier A. Meighen, Lady Laurier and a number of wives of cabinet ministers and others prominent in Canadian public life.

Guard of Honor.
The guard of honor was composed of men from the governor-general's Foot Guards, while the 38th Battalion was drawn up along the side of the walk leading to the buildings. More than a thousand veterans, members of the Ottawa and Westboro branches of the Great War Veterans' Association, with two bands, were behind the 38th Battalion, and they were reviewed by Lord Byng at the close of his speech.

Boy scouts and girl guides were also inspected by his excellency and praised for their smart and soldierly turnout.

Gay With Flags.
The roads leading to Parliament Hill from the central station were gay with flags and bunting in honor of the new governor-general, and decorations throughout the city were general. The state carriage was escorted by a mounted detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police with pennants flying, and the arrival of the royal train was the signal for a salute of nineteen guns fired by the battery of 18-pounders stationed on Nepean Point.

Following the reception on Parliament Hill their excellencies drove to Rideau Hall, their official residence, through streets which were lined by cheering crowds.

Ottawa and Hull had practically declared a half-holiday in honor of the new governor-general, the civil service having been given the afternoon off, and it was made a double welcome to Lord Byng and also to Premier Meighen, who had returned to the capital just a few hours previously.

MESSENGER IS HELD ON BIGAMY CHARGE

WINDSOR, Aug. 12.—Wanted by the police at Halifax, on charges of bigamy and non-support, Frederick J. Richardson, 32 years old, was arrested here today by Detectives McNabb and Renaud.

Richardson, who was formerly in business at Halifax, left that city eighteen months ago. Since then he has been employed here as a messenger at the Bank of Commerce. Richardson is said to have told the police that he divorced his first wife while living in the United States, and that this would entitle him to remarry in Canada.

After Richardson had left Halifax his first wife turned up there and made statements to the police that she knew of no divorce proceedings. He will be held here until the arrival of officers from Halifax.

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NO CHARGES OF MISCONDUCT IN FUEL INQUIRY

Lack of System Was Only Trouble, Says Judge Hardy.

BRANTFORD, Aug. 12.—That there was no charge of malfeasance or misconduct, against any person in connection with the department, is the substance of the report of Judge Hardy, county judge, in his report on the civic fuel inquiry, which was made public here today.

Judge Hardy comments that lack of stock-taking year by year, prevented any responsibility being placed for shortages on hard coal received in 1918, while the sale of soft coal the following year was an error of judgment, as it could have been held and sold at a profit during the following year.

WILL BUS LINE DRIVE CARS OUT?

Enterprise of Citizen Providing Council With Food For Thought.

WINDSOR, Aug. 12.—The success of the bus line operating on runs in the east and west sides of the city tonight drew statements from Ald. A. Strong and F. J. Mitchell that the two other districts in Windsor, in addition to being granted a day-to-day franchise by Walkerville council to operate buses in districts not served by the municipal-owned railways.

The plan to take over the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Railway at the expiration of its franchise was opposed by A. W. Jackson, who was then mayor. He contended that motor-buses would eventually drive trolley cars from the streets. The wisdom of this stand is now becoming apparent, Ald. Strong and Mitchell said tonight, in discussing transportation needs of the border.

The bulk of today's proceedings of the conference was given over to various civic reception, the day officials paying their respects by giving a dinner at noon and following it up with a drive about the city. In the evening the visiting delegates were guests in Hart House Theatre, where Canadian educational motion pictures were presented, and where they were given an eye-opener as to the wonderful resources of Canada. The moving pictures appearing to be a decided surprise to many of the overseas teachers, who were most generous in their applause of the remarkable scenes which were shown on the screen.

Asking for Help.
In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Imperial teachers' convention today the provinces of the Dominion will be asked for financial assistance for the work of the League of Empire, particularly for the establishment of a residential club in London. Thanks was extended to the Rivers branch of the League for assistance and their further aid was requested.

A conference agreed that teachers making exchanges for a limited period should be given credit at home in the education of their salaries for the period in question. These periods of exchange should also, in their opinion, be counted in reckoning pensions. Mutual recognition of certificates by the various dominions and the mother country was accepted as a principle to be adopted.

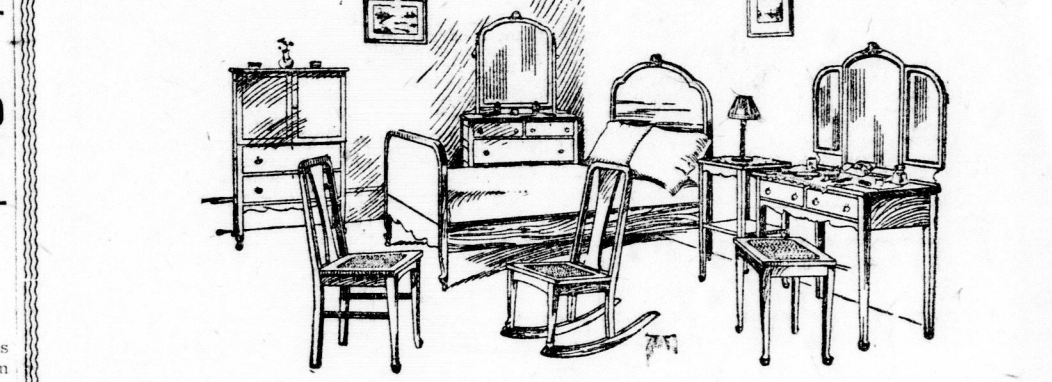

FARMERS ARE CALLING INDIGNATION MEETING

Brantford Township Residents Object To Being Side-Tracked For Hydro.

BRANTFORD, Aug. 12.—Warden Greenwood announced today that an indignation meeting will be called because of the failure to have Brantford Township in the list of twelve townships in which rural hydro lines will be constructed under the new deal, whereby the province pays half the construction cost.

The locals have been agitating for service for over a year, and before the bonusing was considered.
