Rhubarb Pie—The Old-Time Kind



NOT less appetizing than rhubarb meringue pie, the recipe for which was given a few days ago, is real, plain, old-fashioned rhubarb pie.

Here's the way to make it: Mix flour and sugar. Cover bottom crust with half the sugar mixture. Add rhubarb and sprinkle over remaining sugar.

Dampen edge of lower crust and fit top crust very carefully and firmly over lower crust. Pinch edges tightly. The edge of a rhubarb pie must be carefully made, otherwise the pie will boil over and the juice will run away.

FOR THIS RECIPE YOU NEED.

Two tablespoons flour
One cup sugar
One and one-half cups rhubarb, cut up small
Pie dough

Bake 45 minutes in a moderate oven.

Rhubarb and strawberries can be combined in a delicious pie.

Use half as much rhubarb as berries. Wash berries and drain. Dry between paper towels.

Mix two tablespoons flour with one cup sugar for one cup berries and one-half cup rhubarb.

Use as in preceding recipe. This pie can be baked with only one crust and covered with meringue or baked with two crusts and served with whipped cream.
