HOUSE VENTILATION

"Poorly ventilated homes are far more detrimental to the health than homes where the sinks are not ventilated," Mr. Merkle explained. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. J. H. Hancock, of Galt, and by one son, Frank, living on the homestead. The funeral will be held from the residence of Mrs. H. Hancock on Thursday afternoon, Thomas Wilson, of the Wilson Packing Company, Chicago, is a nephew.

FUNERAL OF HARRY FISHER

COMPULSORY VENTING

"While that is true, there are some regulations which could be dispensed with to advantage," Mr. Merkle continued. "For instance, this is the city municipality, so far as I can learn, in which compulsory venting of sinks is in vogue. It is not a health problem, but an optional one, whether a sink is vented or a non-siphon trap is used. Windsor and Toronto do not vent their sinks."
