Corn Growers Association

In response to an invitation from the District Representative of the Department of Agriculture, Petrolia, an enthusiastic number of Lambton County Corn Growers met in convention at Oil Springs on Saturday, May 3rd. Mr. J. Anderson, Warden of County Council, presided.

Addresses by Messrs. John Hunter, Wyoming, R. L. Moorehouse, Cairo, B. W. Fansher, Florence, Alex. Wark, Wainstead; S. C. Smale, Oakdale; brought out many interesting and important points in relation to the growing of corn and the importance of the industry to the county. Seed corn grown in Lambton County will mature from one week to ten days earlier than corn imported from Essex, Kent or United States. It is not only better for home seed but superior as well for the counties which lie to the east and north of Lambton.

W. H. Porter, District Representative, explained the object of the Association and suggested how good seed might be disseminated over the county through the instrumentality of corn shows, schools, farmers clubs, corn clubs and experimental plots.
