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

Canada exports to 44 different untries and has stepped from ninth to fourth place among the great exporting countries of the world.

A statement presented by Hon. Chas. Stewart, minister of Immigration shows that during the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1923, Canada rejected 14,519 persons, including 419 English, 24 Irish, 34 Scotch and 2 Welsh, at her ocean ports and along the international houndary. the international boundary.

Engineer Muir, of the highways department, has been instructed to prepare a report on the roads embraced in the proposed Blue Water Highway. His investigation will take several months. Mr. Muir will prepare full data on the character of all the links in the proposed Windsor-Owen Sound route.

Brig. Gen. King, officer commanding Military District No. 1, address-ed the Collegiate Cadets, at Stratford one day last week, and express-ed the hope that the boys would not have to engage in war, but voiced his opinion that due to unsettled conditions, to Turkey's efforts to play off the nations against one another, or to the actions of Russia in trying to force its form of government on the world, another war would have to be engaged in before the peace that was hoped for could be gained.

John Peter McKinlay, a justice of the peace at Ridgetown for more than 30 years, and the father of Jus-tice John F. McKinlay, of Detroit, died at the latter's home on Thurs day. He would have been 100 years old had he lived until next New Year's day. Judge McKinlay's death vas caused by a storm door blowing against him, knocking him down step. He was born in Aldborough township and lived there until his early manhood. When he retired he was the oldest justice in the province of Ontario in years and in age, as he was psat 90 when he completed his

Inquiries are made as to the law regarding the placing of omitted names on voters' lists for the forthcoming provincial election. The new aw provides that election boards shall law provides that election boards shall be formed for each county. The boards will be composed of judges of the district court, local registrar, sheriff and clerk of the peace. These poards really run the election under the authority of the chief electoral officer, Allan M. Dymond of Toronto. Three members of any board form quorum. The chief electoral officer i to advise the various county boards and supervise and instruct returning officers, poll clerks, and so on. As soon as convenient after the issue of the election writ these boards are to fix times and places in every municipality to hear complaints regarding otpainty to near complaints regarding voters' lists. Public notice must be given of such meetings. The last day for making complaints is two days before the date of the board's sitting. Any person entitled to vote tings. Any person entitled to vote can give notice of complaint as to any other person whose name should ve on the list. Evidence before these boards is all under oath.
