Theological Controversy Continued.

To the Editor of the Weekly Monitor.

Sir,—I do not wish to prolong a theological

controversy in your column, but I would

much like to have published the following

on "Anglican Orders." I will only say by

way of introducing it, that Protestant

Churchmen are not disposed to accept Mr.

Amor's citation of Dr. John Wesley as an

authority in the Anglican Church; and when

he says "as if the Archbishops did not know

such theology and what is in accordance

with the 39 Articles as a layman," I would

like to reply that against the two present

Archbishops we can refer to the Reformation

of the late Dr. Henson—the venerable Dr.

Tall, who said "if we are not a Protestant

Church we are a miserable schism," and con-

demned the doctrine of a sacrificial priest-

hood and the ritual that usually symbolize

it, "as not primitive, but medieval." We

could Mr. Amor with so much confidence

refer Mr. Johnston to his own Bishop, if he

happened to be in the Diocese of Montreal,

Huron, or the one presided over by the

venerable Primate of all Canada—the

Archbishop of Quebec, who, in fact, was

not until about 50 or 60 years ago, when

the "Tracts for the Times," were issued at

Oxford by Pusey, Newman and their asso-

ciates, that the idea of a sacrificial Priest-

hood, as contended for in the "Tracts for

the Times," was introduced as a tenet of the

Anglican Church; and then in order to hold

the position of a "non natural

body," has for many years it received the

countenance from Bishops or Archbishops,

that now, Manning and many others in
