No. 388. [copy.] Downing Street, July 6, 1849.

My Lord—I have deferred acknowledging your Lordship's despatches of the 20th and 23d of January and of May 1849, until it should be in my power to communicate to you the final decision of Parliament on the measure submitted to it by Her Majesty's servants, for the removal of these restrictions upon the commerce of this country.

Looking to the remarkable natural advantages which Canada enjoys, to the great public works by which those advantages have been brought to the aid of the industry and enterprise which distinguish her rapidly increasing population, I can entertain no doubt that now that full scope will be given for the exertion and energy which will be displayed in turning these advantages to the best account, it will soon be proved by the results to be actually fostered, but that, on the contrary, under the stimulus of free competition it will rise rapidly to a prosperity far more solid and lasting than that which could be created by any artificial encouragement.

The importance of the relief which will be afforded to the Trade of the British Colonies, and to the industry and enterprise of that of Canada, by the Act which I now transmit, cannot, I believe, easily be over-estimated, and it is my earnest hope that the inhabitants of Canada will see in this measure a new proof of the desire of Parliament to promote their welfare and to advance their prosperity.
