MESSAGE OF CONFIDENCE

Mrs. Mary Collins (Capilano): Mr. Speaker, I wish to bring to the attention of the House a question which is on the minds of so many Canadians as they start the new year, the question of confidence. 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NUCLEAR ARMAMENTS

REPORTED UNITED STATES PLAN TO STORE NUCLEAR WEAPONS AT CANADIAN BASES

Mr. Ray Skelly (Comox-Powell River): Mr. Speaker, I wish to raise a major concern expressed by many Canadians, and that is the contingency plans of the United States Government to use Canadian military bases and military equipment to store and deliver U.S. nuclear weapons, and specifically nuclear depth charges at Comox and Greenwood. The vast majority of Canadians oppose the concept of Canada's involvement in the storage or delivery of nuclear weapons, and call upon the Prime Minister (Mr. Mulroney) to state unequivocally that Canada will not be involved in the storage or delivery of U.S. nuclear weapons. • (1410)

Canadians remember that the Canadian Government would never acknowledge or give details on the presence or deployment of nuclear weapons in Canada. It would never provide Canadians with information about the testing of the Cruise missile. In the past the American administration has put Canadian bases on alert, which is a compromise in Canadian sovereignty. In the past the United States has flown nuclear weapons regularly into Canada, to be used in the event of a conflict. Present hon. members of the Government, and many candidates in the past election campaign, committed themselves to creating a nuclear weapons free zone in Canada. It is time for the Prime Minister to stand and clear up this matter and ensure that both Canadians and Americans understand that Canada will never be a base for, and Canadians will never use, nuclear weapons.

SHIPBUILDING

GOVERNMENT POSITION

Mr. Edouard Desrosiers (Hochelaga-Maisonneuve): Mr. Speaker, I wish to censor the former Liberal Government most emphatically for the way it has hurt the Canadian shipbuilding industry in recent years by taking its business to foreign countries. As a result, the 16,000 jobs still existing a few years ago dwindled to 7,260 by September 30 last year, and this does not include all the indirect employment lost in related industries. Fortunately, the Liberal Party has almost become a thing of the past. We in the Progressive Conservative Party are now going to try to restore order to our economy.
