

## THE SENATE

Friday, September 15, 1950

The Senate met at 10.45 a.m., the Speaker in the Chair.

Prayers and routine proceedings.

### THE ROYAL ASSENT

The Hon. the Speaker informed the Senate that he had received a communication from the Assistant Secretary to the Governor General, acquainting him that the Honourable Robert Taschereau, acting as Deputy of His Excellency the Governor General, would proceed to the Senate chamber this day at 11 a.m. for the purpose of giving the Royal Assent to certain Bills.

### ADJOURNMENT

#### MOTION

Hon. J. H. King (for Mr. Robertson) moved:

That when the Senate adjourns on completion of current business of the session it stand adjourned until February 14, 1951, provided always that if it appears to the satisfaction of the Honourable the Speaker, after consultation with His Majesty's government, that the public interest requires that the Senate should meet at an earlier time during the adjournment, the Honourable the Speaker may give notice that he is so satisfied, and thereupon the Senate shall meet at the time stated in such notice, and shall transact its business as if it had been duly adjourned to that time.

The motion was agreed to.

The Senate adjourned during pleasure.

### THE ROYAL ASSENT

The Honourable Robert Taschereau, the Deputy to the Governor General, having come and being seated at the foot of the Throne, and the House of Commons having been summoned and being come with their Speaker, the Honourable the Deputy of the Governor General was pleased to give Royal Assent to the following bills:

An Act to make temporary provision for the regulation of consumer credit.

An Act respecting materials and services essential for the purposes of defence and national security.

An Act to amend the Income Tax Act.

An Act respecting payment of sessional allowances and transportation expenses to members of the Senate and the House of Commons.

An Act to amend the Excise Act, 1934.

An Act to amend the Excise Tax Act.

An Act to amend the Customs Tariff.

An Act for granting His Majesty aid for national defence and security.

The House of Commons withdrew.

The Honourable the Deputy of the Governor General was pleased to retire.

The sitting of the Senate was resumed.

The Senate adjourned until Wednesday, February 14, 1951.
