Dear Sir Arthur,

We have read carefully Dr. Harrison's reply to our <u>Memorandum regarding Conditions in Macdonald College.</u> As in our opinion some of his statements tend to obscure the real point at issue, we are taking the liberty of outlining more explicitly the reasons for the unsatisfactory conditions in the College. (In what follows, the marginal numbers correspond with those in our previous memorandum and in Dr. Harrison's reply.)

We wish to repeat that the discontent in the College is not confined to certain members of the staff. It may be said to be general and of long standing; it was shared by many former members of the staff before leaving the College and is widespread among the graduates, of whom some have had official relations with the College. It cannot be explained on the ground of unwillingness of certain members of the staff to cooperate. All the staff are most eager for co-operation - but there is no leadership. If the Principal is unaware of this dissatisfaction, surely this is a reflection on his administration.
