Taking all the elements of the case into consideration, we believe Messrs. Arnold and Moyes made a moderate estimate of the growth of Toronto in placing this at five per cent. for the mext eight years, giving a population of 646,036 for 1921. The Telegram recently forecasted for 1923 a population of 1,000,000. The World several years ago estimated the city's population at 1,000,000 for 1934, and the estimate coincides with the present one of 646,000 for 1921.
