LONDON, Dec. 5 .- (Can. Press) -- The British cabinet, by a royal procla tion promulgated tonight, prohibiting the importation of arms and ammuni n into Ireland, for the first time grasped the nettle of the revolution in Ulster, ich it had hitherto ignored, altho the followers of Sir Edward Carson for the had been advertising their military preparations in every possible way daring interference with them.

Almost simultaneously with the publication of the proclamation, Premier quith made the longest step towards the conciliation of the Ulsterites that government has taken by announcing his acceptance of the principles for a asis of agreement which Sir Edward Carson suggested in his last speech. CONCESSIONS TO ULSTER.

These principles are: First, that the settlement must not be humiliating or degrading to Ulster. meted out to the other parts of the United Kingdom. Third, Ulster must retain full protection of the imperial parliament.
