Ontario Board Warns Licenseholders Against Serving Men From Camp.

WARNING NOW ISSUED

Military Order Also Places All Drinking Places "Out of Bounds."

To back up the military regulation ecently put in force in Dundas, placing all hotels out of bounds except for three hours of the day, the Ontario License Commission yesterday on motion of W. S. Dingman, seconded by Commissioner Ayearst, passed a resclution to the effect that an infraction of such regulation would cost the hotelkeeper disobeying it his license, or at least a suspension of license. The following is the resolution as

moved and adopted: "That whereas it appears from information in the hands of this board that an order has been issued by the military authorities placing all hotels in the Town of Dundas out of bounds except between 5 p.m. and 8 p.m. o the evening every day during the period said order remains in force.

"And whereas in the opinion of this bcard it is desirable to supplement said order with a view to rendering i more effective.

"Therefore be it resolved that if any holder of a tavern license in the said Town of Dundas shall except between the hours aforesaid supply any soldie with liquor or permit same to be supplied the license held by him under the License Act shall be subject to cancellation or suspension for such a period as this board may determine having regard to the circumstances of

"And it is further resolved that if any holder of a shop license in the said Town of Dundas shall except between the hours of 5 and 7 o'clock in the evening supply liquor to any solcancellation or suspension as this beard may determine."
