RUSSIANS IN BULGARIA NEXT WEEK Turks Are Beaten at the Dardanelles TO INVADE BULGARIA IN A WEEK

ALLIES' NAVAL BRIGADES GIVE SERBIANS HELP

British Bluejackets Are Probably Engaged in Fighting Near Mitrovitza.

FRENCH AT MONASTIR

Both Brigades Made Safe Departure After Fall of Belgrade.

LONDON, Nov. 25, 1:40 a.m.—The safety of both the British and French naval brigades which recently were in Belgrade is now assured. The French fleet arrived at Monastir, near the Greek border, a few days ago, and a telegram has been received from Admiral Troubridge, commanding the British brigade, dated from Mitrovitza, Nov. 20, stating that all was well.

British and French naval brigades were sent to Belgrade last fall and took part in the fighting against the Germans and Austrians preceding the evacuation of the capital of the Serbs. While nothing is known officially of the movements of the men since they left Belgrade, or whether they have taken part in any of the numerous engagements against the Germans and Austro-Hungarians, it seems probable that the British, who are in the region of Mitrovitza, are fighting with the Serbs, who evacuated Mitrovitza only a day or two ago.

CO-OPERATION IN BALKANS BY ITALIANS ARRANGED

Cabinet at Rome Will Make Statement to Parliament Next Week.

ROME, Nov. 25.—A council of ministers held today lasting four hours. The ministers were occupied mostly in listening to a full report made by Baron Sonnino, the foreign minister, on the international situation generally, and especially regarding the attitude of Greece and the concessions obtained from her by the entente allies. Baron Sonnino also spoke of the preparations that had been made by Italy for co-operation with her other allies in the campaign in the Balkans. At the council, Premier Salandra gave an outline of the statement that he will make in the name of the government at the reopening of parliament next week.

AMERICAN SECURITIES WILL BE MOBILIZED

Reginald McKenna Promises a Statement on Plan of Government Next Week.

LONDON, Nov. 25, 12:3 a.m.—Replying to a question in parliament yesterday, Reginald McKenna, chancellor of the exchequer, promised to make a statement next week on the question of mobilizing American securities. Nothing was said, however, as to the scope of the legislation proposed on this subject.

GENERAL PAU SETS OUT ON MISSION TO RUSSIA

Will Confer with General Alexieff, Chief of Staff, Legion of Honor.

PARIS, Nov. 25.—At a meeting of the cabinet today presided over by Raymond Poincaré, president of France, Gen. Gerard Pau was charged with a mission to confer with Gen. Michael V. Tziakier, chief of the Russian general staff, the cross of grand officer of the Legion of Honor.

TWENTY-FIVE LIVES LOST OFF B. C. COAST?

TACOMA, Wn., Nov. 25.—Special advice to the Ledger tonight from Victoria, B.C., stated that the Chilean full-rigged four-masted iron ship Carol Mapu had been lost with all hands, numbering about 25.

Where the Tubes Will Go

The Evening News of last night proposes to have the probable location of the north and south tube to be favored by the traction commission (Harris-Couzens-Geary), whose report is promised for next week. It would be from a tunnel it will be under Yonge street. A tunnel with a diving rod in its hand would be the new Union Station downtown, and go under Bay and Terauay streets (extended) to the uptown station on Yonge street.

BRITONS AND RUSSIANS IN PERSIA ARE SAFE

They Have Reached Kasbin, Ninety Miles Northwest of Teheran.

PETROGRAD, via London, Nov. 25.—A telegram from Teheran says that the British and Russian consuls and other members of the Russo-British colonies at Hamadan have arrived safely at Kasbin, 90 miles northwest of Teheran. Several hundred gendarmes and persons opposed to the British and Russians recently attacked Hamadan, but did not enter the town itself.

KITCHENER AND COCHIN REALLY TURNED TRICK

Athens Believes Their Visits Had Great Effect on Greece.

ATHENS, via London, Friday, Nov. 26.—The happy turn of events between the entente powers and the Greek Government is generally attributed here to the visits of Lord Kitchener and Denys Cochin. The joint note of the powers to the Greek Government was only on general lines, and now that the allies' proposals have been accepted in principle, the details will be settled in further special negotiations.

FOES DROWNED IN STRIPA RIVER

German Force Attacked by Russians Near Semikovice and Destroyed.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—German troops which had crossed to the left bank of the Stripa River in Galicia were attacked by the Russians and driven into the water near Semikovice, where they were partially annihilated by the Russian fire and partially drowned in their attempts to escape across the stream. Over one hundred men killed or severely wounded were found on the scene of the action.

SUCCESS NEAR RIGA

Czar's Men Capture Important Hill Near Borsemuende Farm.

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BERLIN STILL HOPING TO WIN BACK GREECE

Ultimatum and Recall of Entente Ministers Reported Imminent.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—According to a Berlin wireless despatch, the Frankfurter Zeitung publishes an assertion from its Constantinople correspondent that "Kitchener's mission to Athens has been fruitless." The correspondent adds: "At every moment an ultimatum and the recall of the entente ministers is expected."

ARKANSAS TORNADO TOOK TOLL OF LIVES

Three Persons Were Killed and Many Hurt at Hot Springs.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 25.—Three persons are known to be dead and 65-injured as the result of a tornado that swept the southeastern corner of Hot Springs, Ark., late today, according to passengers on an Iron Mountain train that reached here at 7:30 tonight. Several buildings were demolished and others unroofed. It is believed that the death list will be increased.

FIGHT WITH TURK PATROL REPORTED FROM EGYPT

Encounter Not Evidence of Recrudescence of Activity Against Suez Canal.

LONDON, Nov. 26.—A despatch to The Times from Cairo, referring to an official communication reporting an encounter with the Turks at Al-Kan-tara, Egypt, explains that it was merely a collision with a patrol and should not be regarded as a recrudescence of Turkish activity.

SWISS FRONTIER IS CLOSED BY GERMANY

GENEVA, via Paris, Nov. 25, 8:50 p.m.—Germany has again closed the Swiss frontier from Basle to Constantine. It will probably remain closed for a week. The reason for this action is unknown.

GERMANS BEGIN EVACUATION OF TOWN OF MITAU

Enemy Gives Up Expectations of Capturing Riga and Dwina Lines.

SEEKS WINTER FRONT

Quadruple Entrenchments Are Constructed in Rear of Present Positions.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—A Petrograd despatch to The Morning Post says: "The Germans have commenced the evacuation of Mitau, their forward base in the Riga-Dwina region, and are preparing to withdraw from the now hopeless task of capturing Riga and the Dwina line."

FRENCH TAKE UP WAR LOAN FAST

First Day's Receipts at Paris Exceeded Forecasts of Experts.

PARIS, Nov. 25.—The first day's subscriptions to the Great Loan of 1915, as the new French loan has been characterized by the editors of finance, brought out a greater number of investors today than had been anticipated. The lines began forming at 9 o'clock at the special loan windows in all the postoffices, at the banks and in the quarters of the loan at the Pavillon de Flore, in the extreme southern wing of the Louvre.

EX-KHEDIVE OF EGYPT TO UNDERGO OPERATION

Abbas Hilmi's Tongue Affliction Drives Him to Geneva Specialist.

GENEVA, via Paris, Nov. 25.—Abbas Hilmi, former Khedive of Egypt, arrived here yesterday to undergo an operation on his tongue. Abbas Hilmi was deposed early in the war because of his machinations on behalf of Germany.

AVIATOR CARLSTROM FORCED TO STOP NEAR BINGHAMTON

Dizziness Compelled Airman To Abandon Project of Uninterrupted Flight From Toronto to New York.

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., Nov. 25.—Aviator Victor Carlstrom, flying from Toronto to New York, seized with dizziness, alighted safely at the Broome County Country Club grounds near Hooper, seven miles west of here, this afternoon. He will continue the flight tomorrow.

HERBERT L. SAMUEL GIVEN SEAT IN IMPERIAL CABINET

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Herbert L. Samuel, postmaster-general, has been given a seat in the cabinet. He was first elected member for the Cleveland division of Yorkshire as a Liberal in 1922; he was appointed to minor offices in the government, and finally he became postmaster-general in 1910. His chief publication is "Liberalism, Its Principles and Proposals." He has delivered many political addresses, and written numerous political pamphlets.

TO STUDY EMPLOYMENT FOR DISABLED SOLDIERS

Report of British Committee Communicated to Governments of Dominions.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, Nov. 25.—A Bonar Law informed Donald MacMaster, in the house of commons tonight, that the report of the committee appointed by the local government board upon the provision of employment for disabled soldiers was communicated to the dominions, and an enquiry made from them regarding the measures that they propose taking. The correspondence was proceeding, and the whole question would be carefully considered.

TURKS' ATTACKS BEATEN OFF BY BRITISH FORCE

Heavy Fighting Renewed at Dardanelles With Disaster to Enemy.

RAILWAY BOMBARDED

Enemy Nervous, Much Harassed. Has to Keep Large Forces at Straits.

THREATEN BULGAR LINES NEAR PRILEP

Heavy Firing a Few Miles South-east Regarded as Significant.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—A Times despatch from Monastir, dated Nov. 23, says: "The Bulgarians have shown no renewed activity on the Prilep front, but the heavy firing heard this morning a few miles south-east of Prilep suggests that somebody has got behind them and is threatening their lines of communications."

FRENCH SHIP SHELLED DODGES SUBMARINE

Steamer Tafia Steered Into Teeth of Gale and Got Safely Away.

PARIS, Nov. 25.—The ministry of marine in a communication made public tonight says that the French steamer Tafia was shelled by a submarine in the western Mediterranean, but that the captain of the steamer with remarkable quickness of decision steered his vessel into the teeth of the gale, and that the submarine, unable to keep up its speed against the head seas, relinquished the chase after firing three shells. The communication adds that some of the passengers, aided by a few members of the crew, notwithstanding the express orders of the captain of the Tafia to the contrary, leaped overboard, which were immediately swamped. The Tafia has arrived safely at Marseilles.
