

the concurrence and approbation of the people, and if its end is that, for which all government ought to be instituted, the happiness of the governed, then will this bill which your Lordship thought atrocious, shallow, and inept, appear consonant to justice, wisdom, benevolence, and policy; and the legislature of this country will have followed an illustrious example of antiquity, in making such regulations for the Canadians; "ut in sua ripa legibusque suis, mente animoque nobiscum agant."
