Official Figures Credit Him High "Games Won."


NEW YORK, Dec. 3.-Rube Marquard of New York stands out as the leader of the pitchers of the National League in the games won record, as shown by the official pitching averages given out by the National League to-day. Marquard pitched in 45 games, won 24, lost 7 and has a percentage of .774. Crandall of New York, with 15 games won and 5 lost, is second with a percentage of .750, and Cole of Chicago, who won 18 games and lost 7, is third with .730. Fourth on the lifet is Alexander of Philadelphia, who pitched 31 cor picte games-more than any other twirler-and is credited with 18 games woh. 13 lost and a percentage of .653.
