YORK TOWNSHIP AND SUBURBS

THREE MILLIONS TO BE SPENT ENLARGING PLANT AT LEASIDE

United States Government Has Awarded Contract for Many Shells There.

PAYROLL OF 7000

Building Will Be Completed and Fitted Before Winter Comes.

Leaside, the home of the new Canadian Northern yards, which will be in use next November and give employment to hundreds of trainmen and other employes, has received another impetus by the announcement made yesterday that the munitions plant there would be enlarged at a cost of at least \$3,000,000.

The new addition will be devoted entirely to the manufacture of 12-inch shells for the United States war department.

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Danforth TOWNSHIP ASSESSORS ASK HIGHER SALARIES

The assessors of York Township have appealed to the reeve and council of York Township for an increase in salary.

"We, the undersigned assessors, urgently impress upon you our views on the question of salary increase on the following grounds, namely: First, the most important factor in this recommendation is the high cost of living, which, as compared with previous years, is fully three-fifths greater.

Second, owing to the vast increase in assessment during the past three years, the present salaries would not be too high under normal conditions.

Third, we prefer to think it unfair to ask a 30 per cent increase on last year's salary.

According to the statement of a member of the assessment department, the application was passed over by the council of W. A. Clarke, assessment commissioner, for consideration.
