

TORONTO IS TOO APATHETIC AS TO CIVIC GOVERNMENT

Should Be More Time for Discussion
in Municipal Campaign and
Business Men for Office.

It is so easy to forget and so easy to be reminded of things. The apathy of the people is a noticeable feature of the part of municipal candidates to stir up public criticism or appreciation of the work of council during this year is in marked contrast to other years. The apathy is suggestive of two things. That council is not inclined to brag, least it fail and that the voters simply don't care what happens.

In discussing the matter a World reporter yesterday asked New Marshall what he thought of it. He could not understand it. "One would think," he said, "that Toronto was a hamlet. It is simply scandalous the way the candidates for municipal honors are waiting to see who is going to run and who is not. It was too bad that the candidates are not men who will declare themselves. It seems to me that the mayor's chair has become an office for office holders only."

When asked the reason why business men of the city were not more active in municipal affairs, Mr. Marshall said that the heads of large concerns were never office seekers. The majority of men in the council had no other real occupation to absorb their time and attention. It was a great pity that some largely interested, clear-cut, commercial men, whose financial and business interests were familiar to the city, would not come out for municipal honors. The present board of control had done more or less of their duty and would doubtless be returned.

Retail Merchants' Position.
The executive of the Retail Merchants' Association had not decided yet whether they will nominate a candidate for mayor, or not, said President Curran yesterday. "As far as I know, there is no man in view, but I believe we should place a man in the field. What we need, most, is a man who would run this city on business principles. No encouragement has ever been given the business man. As soon as he is nominated he is torn to pieces and raked over the coals by everyone. It is high time business men all over this city protected themselves and their rights by having a candidate from their ranks. But such a man is not easily found, whose business would permit him giving up his time and attending to his own interests."

"Hide and Seek."
C. W. Ellis did not believe in the "hide and seek" game played by the aspirants to mayoralty honors in the present election. He thought that each candidate should come out, hold and fearless and state his platform long before nomination day. Such a man would make an efficient mayor. Toronto needed changes and improvements, and the affairs of the city put on a better basis, but until the people demand this the office would be purely a sinecure and an honor, for some wealthy man of business.

LOSING THEIR IDENTITY.

New York Central Will Show Its
Control Over Various Lines.

Detroit, Dec. 21.—Gradually during the coming year that well-known and undeviating line, "Michigan Central," will disappear from all the cars, locomotives and stations of Michigan's leading railroad system. In its place will be painted the words, "New York Central Lines." This change is also being made on all other lines of the Vanderbilt system.

The identity of the particular line will, however, be maintained by small lettering at the end of the car or locomotive designating the original owning line.

The Nickel Plate will be the only line except as it parallels the Lake Shore and the laws of Ohio prevent even a suggestion of consolidation of parallel lines.

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WILL BOYCOTT THE PRIEST WHO PRAY FOR EMPEROR

Workmen Make Significant Threats
—Inflammatory Circulars Widespreadly Distributed.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 21.—Papers which are being distributed by thousands to the workmen are filled with the most inflammatory appeals, exciting the people to an armed rebellion. Many of the articles are especially directed to the army, which is implored, not to shed the blood of the nation. One writer declares: "Citizens, freedom or slavery? Is Russia to be governed by the people or by a band of thieves? Let us rise up and demand the abolition of the autocracy. To the whip and sword and machine gun let us oppose the revolutionary bayonet. Financial ruin threatens to engulf the government. One more blow and the vile regime will be ended."

We Prayers for Caesar.
It is significant that the workmen in the mills and factories have for more than a week been presenting demands that the priests discontinue the usual prayers for the emperor, with the alternative of being boycotted if they did not cease doing so.

At noon to-day the continental train left the Warsaw station with military engine drivers, and a strong guard of soldiers. The tender and locomotive were also heavily armed. Two files of soldiers were drawn up on the platform.

The railroad strike began at the St. Nicholas Station at noon, but the Baltic roads were still working at that hour. The employees of the Putiloff Iron Works to the number of about 1,500 have struck.

The government's advisers show that all the trains with troops which enter the Baltic provinces are being stopped by the insurgents. A number of soldiers in a car were captured and dispersed beyond Dorpat.

The town of Tulum has been released from the insurgents by Russian troops. Revolt spreads. Advice from Tiuman, in the government of Vitebsk, announced that a rising has occurred in that vicinity which the duty to suppress it.

The report that Kharkoff is in the hands of the revolutionists is confirmed. Two hundred and fifty men of the Starobelsk and Lebznik Regiments have joined the revolutionists, and their comrades have refused to go on duty.
