Marquis' Daughter Breeds Horses.  
London Daily Express: Lady Ernest  
time Hunt, the eldest daughter of the  
Marquis of Ailesbury, arrived at  
Avenmouth, Bristol, on the steamer  
Montcalm, with 17 thoroughbred horses  
from her ranch at Avenmouth, Canada,  
where she is conducting an experi-  
ment in breeding high class horses as a  
means of livelihood.

Lady Ernestine personally superin-  
tended the landing of the horses. This  
occupied six hours. From Avenmouth  
they were at once despatched to her  
Irish estate at Avenmouth, where they  
will be broken in before  
being put on the market.

This is the first shipment of horses  
from Lady Ernestine's ranch, and she  
stated it would soon be followed by  
many others. Her plan is to breed the  
horses in Canada and bring them to  
Ireland for training and acclima-  
tization before selling them. She will  
not confine herself, however, to breed-  
ing for the horse market, but will also  
devote her attention to breeding Per-  
cherons for the American market,  
where they are in great demand for  
draught purposes.

When she returns to Canada she  
will take with her several pure thor-  
oughbred stallions for the purpose of  
crossing with the Percherons. She spoke  
with great satisfaction of the fact  
that she was the first woman person-  
ally to bring a lot of horses across the  
Atlantic.

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## PAROLE SYSTEM A SUCCESS

Excellent Results Accomplished by  
Dominion Officer.

The Dominion parole system, under  
the direction of Inspector Archibald,  
has produced a record of which the  
government may be well proud. There  
is no doubt that the system is quietly  
accomplishing a vast amount of good  
of a reformatory nature among of-  
fenders, and a glance at the record  
that has been achieved should inspire  
a little more confidence in those whose  
faith in human nature is low.

Mr. Archibald has recently returned  
from a three months tour of the United  
States and the Canadian west, dur-  
ing which he personally inspected all  
the parole systems across the line and  
investigated cases all thru the west.  
The result of his observations is in-  
teresting. The systems across the line,  
he says, are not as satisfactory as the  
system in Canada, the authorities not  
exercising the same care in releasing  
men as does the minister of justice at  
Ottawa, and their percentage of re-  
turns varies from 15 to 25 per cent,  
as compared with only 2 to 4 per cent  
in Canada. For the year ending June  
30, nearly 300 men were placed on pa-  
role from Canadian institutions, with  
the loss of only 2 to 4 per cent, as  
compared with the loss of 15 to 25 per  
cent in the United States.

During the last six years over  
800 men have earned their full liberty  
under the parole system in Canada,  
and are now doing well.

With the last two years, the system  
has been extended to the jails also,  
and is working out very satisfactorily.  
It has been found that a few  
months of a man's sentence will often  
encourage him to do better. Taken al-  
together, Mr. Archibald states,  
after comparing the parole system in  
Canada with that of the United States,  
the Canadian system is the best in  
the world, judged by results.

In addition to seeking out and plac-  
ing these parole men in employment,  
Mr. Archibald has gone further and  
has even recommended them to Chris-  
tian organizations, and many of these  
men have turned out actively useful  
workers in various denominations.

From here he leaves for an inspection  
tour of the provinces of Ontario, Mani-  
toba and Western Ontario, for the balance  
of the week.

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## KILLED IN ELEVATOR.

Fatality on the 13th Floor of the  
New Traders' Bank.

Percy Hill, aged 25, a carpenter's la-  
borer, had his neck broken by the  
weights of a passenger elevator on the  
thirteenth floor of the Traders' Bank  
Building yesterday. Coroner Atkins  
will hold an inquest to-day.

Hill was going up with a load of  
material on a freight elevator, and  
on reaching the thirteenth floor, stepped  
off the elevator on a beam run-  
ning between the two cars. Before he  
could respond to a warning of danger  
given by a bystander, the weights of  
the passenger elevator struck him,  
crushing him to the beam. He was  
dead before he was extricated.

Hill and his wife lived at 5 Clarence-  
square.

"REDS" TAKE REVENGE.  
One Officer Killed, Another Injured  
and More Are Threatened.

Moscow, Oct. 4.—Capt. Dzankowsky,  
who was shot and killed in a street  
here yesterday, was assassinated in  
pursuance of a sentence of the revolution-  
ists.

He was the commander of a company  
of the Petrova Regiment, which, on  
Aug. 16, killed two political prisoners  
during an outbreak among the political  
officers confined in the central prison  
of Moscow.

Several members of drumhead courts-  
martial have also been sentenced to  
death by the revolutionists.

Simbirsk Province of Simbirsk, Rus-

governor of Simbirsk, had a narrow  
escape from assassination to-day. A  
gunman was thrown at him, wounding  
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him in the hand and leg. His injuries  
are not fatal.
