ANOTHER TRAGIC DEATH.

J. Leslie Hopwood, Late Col. Surge of the G.O.M., Wilfully Shoots Himself While Alone in the Armory.

Yesterday's papers contained a paragraph stating that J. Leslie Hopwood was missing from his home, 90 Harbord-street. At 10 o'clock yesterday morning his corpse was found in room B of the Armory, making one more victim of the epidemic.

Hopwood was an employee of the Canada Life Assurance Co. On Saturday morning he left his home about 9 o'clock, arriving at the office shortly afterwards. He drew \$5 from the cashier and went out. The dead body was found with a bullet wound near the heart. The deceased was taken one of the regular army rifles, placed it on a counter and touched the trigger with the ramrod.

For some time past Hopwood has been talking about suicide. He said he was afraid he was going to lose his reason. He was about 35 years old, and has been in the employ of the Canada Life for some years.

He was here from Peterboro. He was a recently color sergeant in the G.O.M. The remains will be taken to Lindsay for burial. No inquest will be held.

DISCUSSION ON LEGALITY OF 21 CENTS PER HOUR.

Northwestern Society. Protest Against Abolishing Parks Department—York Street Bridge and Intake Pipe Bylaws Finally Carried—How the City's Money Was Spent in the Court House Suit.

All the members of the Council were present at the meeting yesterday afternoon.

There was an animated discussion on the recommendation of the Board of Control to pay the striking bricklayers' laborers on the Court House at the rate of 21c per hour pending a settlement. Ald. Jolliffe and Crane objected to the adoption of the report.

Ald. Scott moved that the matter be referred back. The Mayor, Ald. McMurich, Lamb and R. H. Graham, all voted in favor of the report.

Ald. Jolliffe said he had been informed that Mr. Lennox said he had work to do on the Court House, and that he was now employed if they go on strike. He advocated that the matter be left to the architect and the men to settle themselves.

During the course of the discussion it was claimed by Ald. Crane that the City had no right to pay the bricklayers more than the rate of 21c per hour.

Ald. Jolliffe said that he had given an opinion to that effect. Ald. Crane said that he was not sure of that.
