FIENDISH CRUELITIES

Fired Against the Cuban Insurgents

Who Captured Victoria de las Tunas

—A Heavy Fire.

avana, Sept. 27.—Alleged details of

capture of Victoria de las Tunas,

viceroy of Santiago de Cuba, by the

insurgent forces, have been issued from

palace here. They say that after

Spanish troops surrendered, the in-

surgents began plundering the stores and

residences and committed many

acts of violence against women and girls, "not

respecting the sister of General
