Salisbury Has Taken a Position and Closed the Gate Behind Him as Regards the Occupation of Fashoda-Marchand and His Contingent Must Get Out or There Will Be Trouble -British Press and Public Support Salisbury-Cable News

Britain is said to have sent an ultimatum to France.

- The ultimatum is the climax of the occupation of Fashoda in the Upper Nile Valley by a French officer, Major Marchand-
- He set out from French West Africa two years ago on an exploring expedition. He turned up a few days ago on the Nile and planted the French flag there.

The commander of the Anglo Egyptian army marched to Fashoda after capturing Khartoum and told Marchand to get out. Marchand refused to go, saying he had orders from the French Government to stay.

- The Sirdar reported to the British Government, which promptly notified the French Government that no European power except England will be tolerated anywhere in the Nile Valley.
- France so far has refused to bu dge.
