THE PREMIER'S IT ALL LOOKS LIKE A GENERAL ELECTION.

Authorities at Washington Take a Peculiar View of His Speech. THE YANKEES WON'T YIELD. And They Say Sir Wilfrid Knows This and is Pointing Out to Canada the Danger of War.

Sir Wilfrid Seems to Desire to Tone Down His Words Somewhat Now. Ottawa, July 23.—(Special.)—The World's despatch from Montreal announcing a dissolution and general election this fall did not cause much surprise here, as it has been expected for some time past that if the Government would pass the Senate resolution which has given notice in the House, but not in the Senate, and send it to the Senate for concurrence. This, it is regarded as certain, will be refused, and the Government would feel justified in asking His Excellency for a dissolution and appeal to the electorate as against the Senate, hoping to get a snap judgment on the cry of Senate reform.

There is no doubt that preparations have been quietly going on here for some time, looking to the possibility of a general election. In the first place, the voters' lists for the whole Dominion are being printed at the Printing Bureau. The lists for Ontario and Quebec are understood to be printed and ready for revision. A vote of \$50,000 has been asked for to pay for this printing. The position of the voters' lists for the year 1898, and will be useless unless revised in the course of the next three months. Then, there are three vacancies in the Senate, and two more seats are liable to be vacated at almost any moment, on account of the ill-health of the gentlemen holding them, and there are half a dozen or more members with overdue promissory notes for

positions in their pockets, who are clamoring for the redemption of the notes. They Want Bye-Elections. This would mean more bye-elections, and after the revelations in West Hants and West Huron, and the still worse revelations expected in Brockville, the Government is not "banking" on bye-elections, as it is the question of Mr. Tupper's stomach, on which a good deal depends just now. Before the late Ontario Mr. Tupper told your correspondent his opinion that the Government would not continue Minister of Public Works, and that he would not work himself to death.

Without "the Master of the Administration," Sir Wilfrid may hesitate about forcing an election, and ready to lead the House in point is that those who argue for an election are not a different story. An unprecedented election in the last two years, and urge that the Government should take advantage of being with the tide before it recedes or commences to ebb. Before the Snow Flies. MAHMUNDS LICKED THE KHAN. One Hundred Men Were Killed and 120 Were Wounded on Friday. Bombay, July 23.—There is trouble on the frontier, growing out of a quarrel between the Khan of Nawal and sections of the Mahamudis. A battle was fought Friday, in which 100 men were killed and 120 wounded. The Mahamudis were victorious.

LYNCHED AT DAYLIGHT. One Negro Was Killed Near the Seaford and Two Others Found Dead. Baldrige, Ga., July 23.—A negro, captured near Iron City last night, and who was identified as one of the assassins of the late President, was lynched at daylight this morning near Seaford. Two other negroes who were arrested yesterday at the same place, and were implicated in the outrage were found dead.

WINNIEG TOPICS. Attorney-General Cameron Goes for a Vacation, Which Does Not Look Like Early Elections. ONE CENT EXPLOSIVES BEING USED IN CLEVELAND. A Euclid Avenue Trolley Car Loaded With Passengers Was Blown Up JUST BEFORE MIDNIGHT.

Nitro-Glycerine or Gun-Cotton Had Been Placed on the Track by Fiends. FOUR PERSONS WERE BADLY HURT. Explosion Tore Out the End of the Car and it Was Heard for Two or Three Miles.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 23.—A Euclid Avenue car, loaded with passengers, was wrecked by an explosion of nitro-glycerine or gun cotton shortly before midnight. Four persons were badly hurt, the names of the injured being Albert E. Fassett, E. A. Smith, Mrs. Harris and Mrs. E. C. Martin.

The explosion tore out the front end of the car, smashed all the windows and destroyed the brakes. After considerable difficulty the car was stopped and a call for ambulance was sent out. The force of the explosion was so great that it shook all the houses in the neighborhood and was heard at a distance of two or three miles.

There is no clue to the identity of the perpetrators who placed the explosive on the track. CORONER'S JURY SAYS MURDER. That Levi Stewart Did Kill James Ross at St. Denis Grove, Sandwich South.

Windsor, Ont., July 23.—The inquest on the death of James Ross, the colored man, who died Tuesday night from the effects of a blow on his head, was held yesterday in Denis St. Louis Grove, in Sandwich South. After hearing the evidence the coroner's jury brought in the following verdict: "That Levi Stewart did wilfully, feloniously, and with malice aforethought, kill and murder James Ross."

THE BOILER EXPLODED. On the Austrian Torpedo Boat Adler and Five Persons Killed. Pisa, Austria, July 23.—One of the boilers of the Austrian torpedo boat Adler exploded to-day while the vessel was off the island of Torcola, in the Adriatic Sea, killing six men and wounding four members of the crew.
