City to Supply Site for the Militia and Build Suitable Barracks.

EXHIBITION GROUNDS LEASED

Toronto Might Lose Fair Buildings at Wish of Dominion Government.

Assessment Commissioner Fleming has forwarded a letter to the Mayor respecting the acquisition by the city of the Garrison Commons.

The proposition is for the city to acquire a site outside of this municipality, suitable for military purposes, and to exchange the same with the Dominion government for the Garrison Commons, and, in addition, to pay the government such a sum of money as will be agreed upon between the parties so as to enable the government to erect first-class buildings for the militia, or otherwise as may appear right to the government.

The Commissioner says the sum to be expended to secure the site may be more than the Council would think of spending, but he counsels the aldermen to apply for legislation enabling the city to carry out negotiations, provided satisfactory arrangements can be made. He also suggests that the terms of the proposed legislation be published, so that the citizens may have an opportunity of protesting if they so desire.

Mr. Fleming, in speaking of the proposition, said: "The city should have this property for park purposes or other uses. We are at present only leasing the Exhibition grounds, which are a part of the Commons, and we have placed about \$200,000 worth of improvements upon land which can and may be taken away from us at any time. Something should be done to retain this property, and now is the time to do it."

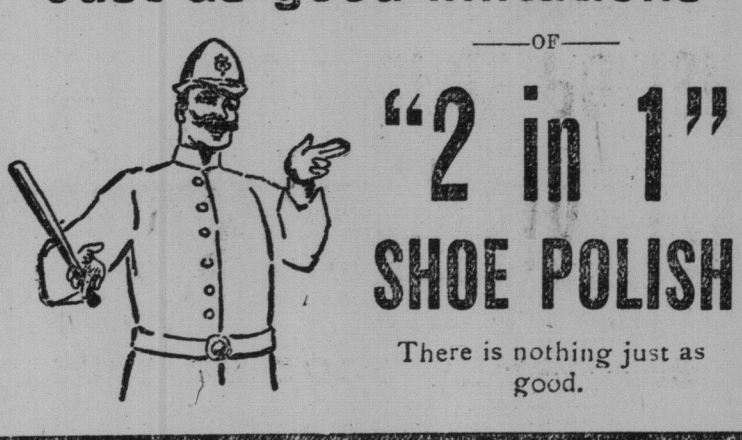

BILLS ADVANCED A STAGE

Purely Routine Work Accomplished by the Legislature in a Short Session.

REPEAL OF CONNIE ACT DELAYED

Mr. Downey's Bill Stands Over—Why, Hon. Registrarship is Vacant.

The legislature held a short session yesterday and advanced a number of bills a stage. There was nothing in any of the bills of sufficient moment to require discussion. Mr. Downey again moved to move the second reading of his bill to rescind the Connie clauses of the Municipal Act, but as Mr. Connie was not in his seat, the Premier asked that the bill be allowed to stand.

Bills Read a First Time. The following bills were introduced: Mr. Pease—Respecting the Town of Port Arthur. Mr. Auld—Respecting the Township of Pelee.

Mr. Lucas—To amend the act to provide for the garnishment of the wages of civil servants in the Municipal Act, but as Mr. Connie was not in his seat, the Premier asked that the bill be allowed to stand.

Mr. Stratton—Respecting municipal houses of refuge. Mr. Gibson—to amend the Loan Corporation Act; to amend the Land Titles Act.

To Remove Disqualification. Mr. Rose moved that his bill to amend the Municipal Act by removing the disqualification of persons enjoying exemption from military training for municipal office be read a second time. This was carried.

The Attorney-General's bill to amend the Children's Protection Act of Ontario was given its second reading. Briefly, the bill seeks to throw around neglected children a larger measure of protection than is given them at the present time. When children are charged with offences against the law, the magistrate must provide for their detention, but in no case must they be committed to jail.

Second Readings. Mr. McCarty's bill to amend the Municipal Drainage Act, Mr. Duff's bill entitled "The Hospital Compensation Act" and Mr. McCarty's bill to amend the Street Railway Act, were read a second time.

The following private bills were given a second reading: Respecting the Town of Peterboro' (Stratton). Respecting the Colonial Portland Cement Company, Limited (McKay). To amend the act incorporating the Huron Electric Railway Company (McKay).

To incorporate the Sarina, Petrolia and St. Thomas Railway Co. (Hanna). To incorporate the Stratford Radial Railway Company (Brown). Respecting the Town of Listowel (Brown).

Respecting the City of Ottawa (Hull). Respecting the incorporation of the College of St. Jerome, Berlin (Lackner). To incorporate the Lac Seul, Rat Portage and Keewatin Railway (Cameron, Fort William).

Respecting the Ontario and Sault Ste. Marie Railway Company (Cameron, Huron). To incorporate the Belleville and Point Anson Railway Company (Russell).

Third Reading. The following bills were read a third time: To amend the Public Libraries Act (Harcourt); respecting the Necropolis Burying Ground, South Dorchester (Brewer); respecting St. James' Cathedral, Toronto (Pryor).

House in Committee. In committee, the House agreed to several bills, with some amendments: To amend the act incorporating the Ontario Electric Railway (Graham); respecting the Lake Superior Power Company and certain other companies (Combe); respecting the municipal Bruce mines and Algoma Railway Company (Smyth); respecting the County of Lanark (Matheson).

Questions by Members. Replying to Dr. Nesbitt, Hon. Mr. Latchford said that J. A. McMaster was appointed overseer on Markham and Warren road in May, 1902. The sum of \$180 was sent to him on May 23, with a bond for execution. About one and a quarter miles of road were improved.

Replying to Dr. Jessop, Hon. Mr. Dryden said there was at present one experimental fruit station in the County of Lincoln, and one in Wentworth. It is, therefore, not the intention of the government to establish an experimental fruit farm in Lincoln County.

Receipts of Alameda Registrar. To Mr. Matheson, the Attorney-General said the receipts of the registrar of Alameda for the years 1900, 1901 and 1902 were as follows: \$2044.73, \$2043.24, \$2018.53. The registrar also receives a grant of \$800. The government was considering the advisability of withdrawing the grant if the fees keep up to the figures of the last few years.

In reply to Dr. Barr, Mr. Stratton said the cost to the province of the smallpox epidemic of 1902 was \$25,178.

No Dominion Subsidy. Mr. Latchford informed Dr. Nesbitt that no subsidy had been granted by the Dominion government to the Temiskaming Railway. There had been no correspondence between the government and the railway company.

Mr. Taylor, Mr. Dryden said John Darrach was still Clerk of Municipal Statistics.

Why Registrarship is Vacant. Explaining why a registrar had not been appointed for the County of Huron, the Attorney-General informed Mr. Taylor that it was more difficult to reconcile the various views in counties which were divided into three constituencies than in other counties. The government had not given consideration to the question of amending the Registrar Act so as to permit the County of Huron to appoint a registrar.
