Similar changes have taken place in the organization of units representing other sections of Canada. Western Ontario is now represented by the 1st, 18th and 47th Battalions in France. In other words instead of five battalions there, there are now three supplied by Western Ontario, which formerly was represented by the 1st, 18th, 160th, 161st and 2nd Pioneers. The 160th and the 161st have been united in the 47th, and the 2nd Pioneers have in all probability been disestablished, and the men drafted into construction units. men drafted into construction units.



JEWELRY TAX WILL NOT BEAR NOW AS **HEAVILY ON TRADE**

Interpretations Placed On Or-

der Satisfy Local Jewelers. According to local jewelers, the war tax which has been recently imposed on jewelry is not nearly so serious as at first appeared, owing to the fact that the interpretation given is only applicable to "jewelry for personal adornment," and does not touch watches, clocks, table silverware and such articles of utility. In the second place, the excise tax of 10 per cent on jewelry now held in stock is to be made applicable. the excise tax of 10 per cent on jewelry now held in stock is to be made applicable only to stocks purchased since October 1, 1917, according to an amendment to this effect to the original act decided upon by the acting m inister of finance, Hon. A. K. McLean.

The original resolution provided that the tax be paid on all stocks remaining on hand before May 1, no matter when purchased.

"If it is the case that the tax only affects jewelry purchased since October 1, that will not amount to anything serious," said a prominent Dundas street jeweler today, "in view of the fact that jewelers carry over a considerable amount of their stock from year to year."
