DESERTER JOINS W. O. R.

With Defaulter He Is Found
Fit For Overseas Service,
and Dons Khaki.

Friday's harvest of recruits was a good one at the London mobilization centre at the armories and ten men in all were attested during the day. Two were from this district and the remainder were sent here by the British-Canadian Recruiting Mission from various places along the border.

One deserter was passed upon by the doctors, and another man who surrendered himself was found to be fit for all-round service, and was sent to the 1st Depot Battalion, W. O. R. No men were apprehended for evasion of the act. Frank L. Ostrander of Aylmer was sent up for an examination by the deputy registrar, and was rated "Category A."

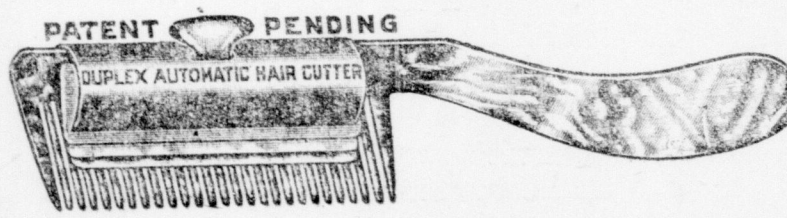

WILL ASK POLICE TO
LICENSE BICYCLES
TO PREVENT THEFTSG. A. Wenige Attended Con-
vention of Dealers.

G. A. Wenige of the Ontario Bicycle and Motor Sales Company has returned from Hamilton, where he attended the first session of the Canadian Bicycle Dealers' Association. This was the organization meeting, and Mr. Wenige reports it most successful. There were about 250 delegates present, and the deepest interest was taken in the session.

Matters pertaining to the trade were discussed at length. The question of preventing the theft of bicycles, which has come to be quite a prevalent crime, was taken up, and it was proposed that a license be issued by the police department, as was done in Winnipeg. The majority of bicycles stolen in that city were recovered.

Addresses were delivered by George A. Wenige, this city, on "Advertising"; by M. Rawlinson, Toronto, on "Cost of Selling"; by P. A. M. Toronto, on "Bicycle Times Sales"; and by many others.

Mr. Wenige was elected secretary-treasurer, and he is most hopeful of the success of the venture.

"We are anticipating a big year in 1918," said Mr. Wenige. "We decided to organize to protect ourselves and to organize for mutual benefit and protection. There were 75,000 bicycles sold in Canada in 1917, and we expect that this year we will double our sales this year. It was more than pleasant with the meeting. We did not decide where we will hold the convention next year. It will be an annual affair."

SALARY INCREASES
ELSEWHERE WILL BE

CROSS-CUT SAWS NOW
IN GREATER DEMAND

Fuel Shortage Boosts Sales—Hardware Markets Reviewed.

In its market comment this week, Hardware and Metal refers to the demand for crosscut saws, caused by the fuel shortage. In summing up the markets, it says in part:

Two features of interest during the week are the decline of \$1 per hundred pounds in the price of white lead in oil and the increase of 50c per hundred pounds in the price of putty. The decline in white lead in oil is attributable to the fact that this commodity has not been moving very freely of late and stocks have been accumulating. Advances in automobile accessory prices have again been numerous. Increases in price have also been recorded on some of the regular hardware. The iron and steel situation gives promise of being even more acute in the future as fuel and shortage of fuel and the transportation facilities are hampering the trade in the United States. Intimations have been made that the Canadian trade will only be able to obtain 50 per cent of its requirements in sheet steel from the United States mills during the coming year. Cement has also been advanced in price.

There is a good demand for crosscut saws at the present time, owing to the shortage of coal, which has sent the consumers in quest of other kinds of fuel.

HIGH WIND CAUSE
OF HYDRO BREAKSGiven as Reason for Interruptions of
Local Services.

There were several interruptions in the hydro service last night and this morning. The high wind is given as the cause.

"The trouble was local in three or four instances," said J. V. Buchanan, general manager of the utilities commission. "Some of our lines went down and our men have been working since 4 o'clock this morning."

"Our service was also interrupted from outside sources. The wind is very high, and that is responsible for this condition."

EASTERN LEAGUE VOTES
TO STICK IN THE GAME

Springfield, Mass., Jan. 12.—At a meeting of the Eastern League here it was voted last night to continue during the season of 1918. The schedule will open May 22 and close September 7, including 88 games, 14 less than were played last year.

STEADINESS OF COLD
UNUSUAL THIS YEAR;
SEVEN "ZERO" DAYSSince Dec. 17 Thermometer
"Below" Quarter of Time.

WARMEST DAY BUT 41

Even "Hot Spells" of Winter
Little Above Freezing
Point.

Steadiness of the intense cold which has been London's lot this year has been exceptional. Since winter arrived in earnest there has practically been no let-up in the severity of the weather. The lowest temperature of the season, 12 below, on December 20, is not as severe as in recent years, but since December 10, almost a month ago, the warmest it has been was 41, or just nine degrees above freezing.

Scanning the weather statistics recently, it is found that while there have been seven days out of 27 when the thermometer was zero or below, including today, the highest "low" reading was 34, or only two degrees above freezing.

The high and low records since December 10, when the present cold snap set in, tell their own story. They are:

ADVOCATES LAW TO
COMPEL DOCTORS TO
REPORT ALL CASESR. E. O. A. Asks Legislation
to Combat Social Evil.

RECOMMEND QUARANTINE

Regulations Similar to Those
for Smallpox Requested in
Letter to Secretary.

Real estate owners of London, whose organizations are famous for their many regulations, deviated from their usual course on Friday night, and wrote a letter to the secretary of the R. E. O. A. asking for legislation to combat social evil.

The letter and the following was ordered sent to the Provincial Secretary: "London, Jan. 12, 1918."

Hon. D. W. McPherson,
Provincial Secretary, House of Assembly,
Toronto.

Dear Sir:—At the regular weekly meeting of the R. E. O. A. on Friday, January 11, I was directed to communicate to you the following:

The Real Estate Owners Association deems it expedient that the Government of the province should take immediate action in framing and enforcing regulations similar to those for smallpox, to combat the social evil, commonly known as venereal disease.

The venereal disease is a universal in the highest class of humanity by the ravages of which it takes thousands of lives and renders many others unfit for service. It is a disgraceful and repulsive disease, and when we find the ravages of the social evil, as now shown to exist to a very alarming extent, adding to the downfalling of human existence, we feel that some drastic action must be taken to protect not only the present but all future generations.

We suggest an enactment that will compel every medical practitioner, in the province, to report every case of the venereal disease, and that all such reported be compelled to take refuge in a quarantine hospital similar to that in operation for the communal protection from smallpox.

We feel that it is the duty of the province of Ontario to set an example not only to the Dominion, but to the world at large.

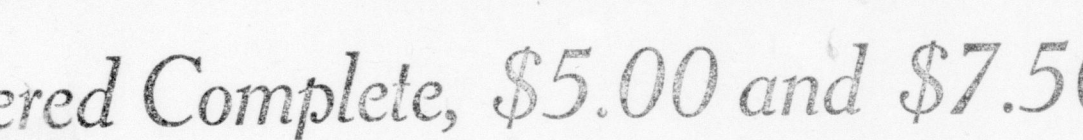
