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DISCUSS RESERVOIR OF TWENTY MILLION GALLONS AT MEETING

Utilities Commission Talks Over Construction of New One at Springbank.

A proposal for the construction of a new twenty-million-gallon reservoir at Springbank Park, just east of the present reservoir, was discussed yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the utilities commission. General Manager D. Buchanan submitted what was described as a preliminary report on the project, and the intention of the commission was to secure the opinion of an outside engineering expert before laying the proposal before the electors of the city for an expression of their opinion.
