

HOG BUYERS TALK OF \$15 LEVEL SOON

Bradstreet's Reports Lower
Prices — Merchants'
Business Good.

London reports to Bradstreet's that the cattle and hog markets are more or less demoralized as compared with the heavy demands and high prices of July and August. Hog buyers are talking about a \$15 level to be brought about in course of another three or four weeks. At present they are offering around \$17 per hundredweight to the farmers. Cattle prices are also dropping considerably, though not as much as in the case of hogs. Apart from these declining prices, the farmers are better satisfied than they expected, as the winter feeds are not anything like as scarce as expected. Retail trade is keeping up well and in a few cases is in very good shape. Travelers returning from their trips through the country since the holidays report that merchants are buying very freely.

WHAT HAS BECOME OF G. T. R. TRAINS WHICH HELPED FAIR TRAFFIC?

Transportation of Past Days No Longer
in Evidence.

During the heavy rush of visitors to the Western Fair, the London Street Railway has been severely taxed transporting the thousands of people who are accumulating dividends, with taxis as the only opposition. Many local citizens this week recalled the days when the Grand Trunk Railway ran special passenger trains from the downtown station here to London, carrying huge crowds to and from the exhibition grounds. These trains were run at regular intervals on Fair days, and were drawn by yard engines. The fare was cents each way, and although profits were not every trip were very satisfactory, and the passengers enjoyed the ride without interruption by other traffic, the system was discontinued. Just why this annual custom was abandoned by the Grand Trunk is unknown to many in this city, but in their opinion it was not due to monetary loss on the trips.

G. OF C.'S INFORMATION BUREAU PROVED OF GREAT VALUE TO FAIR VISITORS

Nearly 400 Provided With Accommoda-
tion—Big Work Ahead.

Between three and four hundred visitors to the city this week have been provided with rooms and breakfasts through the service of the information bureau in the Chamber of Commerce, after the people had unsuccessfully applied at all of the hotels. W. Casson, in charge of the bureau, has found that his department would have been even more useful if a more efficient method of advertising the bureau had been adopted, because of the difficulty in circulating the knowledge of its work and situation. This year's results will pave the way for a greater effort next year in reuniting all visitors who come to the city during the Western Fair week with the necessary details. A larger clerical staff will most probably be required next year, too, for Mr. Casson, being the only responsible official, often had to work until 2 or 3 in the morning of this week.

Satisfaction with the rooms secured was expressed by many of the visitors who were asked for the information bureau, and who took the trouble to telephone to the bureau before leaving the city to express their thanks.

HUNGARIAN COUNT IS HELD AS BANDIT

Woman Robbed of \$3,060
Identifies Him, Police
Report.

Detroit, Sept. 12.—Mrs. Cisimera Urbanzyk, 1083 Joseph Campau avenue, who was attacked and robbed Wednesday night of \$3,060 she carried in her stocking, positively identified Thomas Cichocki, 11 years old, 1577 Ironville avenue, as one of her assailants, police say. Cichocki, known to the police as the "Hungarian Count," and once arrested as a suspect in a safe robbery, was arrested by Detectives Rode, Blasak and Pol on a description furnished by Mrs. Urbanzyk. The injured woman is now believed to be out of danger in Receiving Hospital. Examination revealed that her skull is not fractured, as was at first supposed. Police are searching for the two other men who were in the motor car from which the bandits alighted and attacked Mrs. Urbanzyk, as she was on her way to a dentist's office. Cichocki has told conflicting stories of his whereabouts Wednesday night, the police say, but saying he was home all evening, and later that he was playing pool in a Medbury avenue pool room until midnight.

The erection of the new ovens will mean a further enlargement of the plant, and the necessity for the erection of an additional blast furnace, which will cost in the neighborhood of another million and a half dollars.

PRICE READJUSTMENTS ON SEVERAL METAL LINES

Hardware and Metal, September 13,
will say:

Revisions have been made in some quarters on galvanized and black steel sheets, resulting in an advance in both of these commodities. Steel plate is just the reverse, having shown a slight decline. The market is firm at present levels which are in the form of a readjustment than otherwise.

Boiler tubes, seamless, show an advance ranging from 5 to 7 1/2 per cent, with lapweld tubes in some sizes similarly affected. These changes, it is indicated, bring prices more in line with latest prices issued by the manufacturers.

A somewhat lower level of prices has been established on both electric weld and fire weld chain this week. Another important change is that recorded on iron rivets which show an advance in new discounts issued over former levels, approximately 10 per cent.

Prices on window glass show a decline in new discounts issued about 7 1/2 per cent. This is true of both single and double diamond glass with the exception of the first three brackets of single and double diamond glass, which offsets change in discount very largely.

834 NEW RAILROAD CARS ARE PUT IN SERVICE EVERY DAY

U. S. Railway Administration Doing
Everything Possible To Re-
lieve Shortage.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 12.—New freight cars are being placed in service by the railroad administration at the rate of 834 per day, and every effort is being made to relieve car shortages occasioned by the movement of fall crops and reviving business. Director-General Hines announced today.

The railroad administration, Mr. Hines said, "is fully alive to the importance of the car supply situation, and is handling the matter energetically. Every effort is being made to speed up the construction of the one hundred thousand freight cars ordered last year. The railroad administration has decided to place all these cars in service irrespective of whether or not the allocations are accepted by the railroad corporations."

45,000 OF KOLCHAK'S ARMY SURRENDERS WITHIN A WEEK

London, Sept. 12.—The remainder of Admiral Kolchak's southern army, in the region of Aklavik and Orisk, has surrendered to the Bolsheviks. It is claimed in a Bolshevik wireless dispatch from Moscow today that this is the total of Bolshevik captures from the Kolchak forces within a week to 45,000 men.
