Mr. Dewey pointed to the "heaping of treasures," the amassing of great wealth by a few men today, while a great many are poor and suffering, as one of the signs prophesied as preceding the return of Christ.

That in preaching the doctrine of premillenialism, he was taking a view of scriptural interpretation only held by one or two other ministers in London, was a comment made by Mr. Dewey to The Advertiser. On succeeding Sunday evenings, Mr. Dewey will speak of the domestic and the theological signs of Christ's coming back to earth in person to bring the world under his righteous and peaceful domination. 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
