Continued From Page 1. he is worth," said the mayor. "We pay the heads of departmenst well, and I think the controllers do just as much work as the other officers of the corpora-tion." The mayor, however, does not think the members of the board should give their entire time to the city's ser-vice.

Controller Shaw, however, thought the increase should be granted. "A man can't do justice either to his own business or to the city under the present system. The controllers should give their whole time to the city, and the salarry should b \$2500 or \$300."

Ald. Ramsden: It's too big a jump under present conditions, where the controllers give only part of their time to the work. I was not at the committee meeting or I would have voted against the increase: \$1500 would be enough.

Ald. Harrison: I have not seen the report, but I do not think it wise. I do not think the position should be made dependent on a mere monetary consideration.

Ald. Foster: It is not necessary for the board of control to have so many meetings. It could transact all of its business at one session instead of doing a little at a time; \$1000 or \$1500 is salary enough.

salary enough.

People Should Decide. Ald. Sheppard: I am not in favor of the increase to controllers to the extent recomended by the legis-lation committee. The people should

lation committee. The people should first be asked to vote upon it. The salary of \$2500 is out of all proportion to the \$300 paid aldermen.

Ald, McGhie: I am inclined to the view that they should not be paid at all. Aldermen and controllers should be willing to do the work for the honor of it. The mayor should be paid, but no other elected official.

Ald Woods: I will support the recommendation of the legislation committee.

In the opening of the windpipe he inserted a small pipe, provided with a valve for breathing, which is continued by a tube of India rubber, into which the air passes during respiration.

Why Mouth Waters.

In The Journal de Psychologie, M. Mayer treats of the influence of the mind on bodily secretions. We know that a tempting morsel of food makes the "mouth water," and that stories or memories can bring tears to the eyes. Observations on dogs have shown that the nature of the saliva secreted at the sight of food depends on the nature of the food. The stomachic secretions of the dog are also excited bw the sight of food. Some dogs, however, of a "coid, positive temperament." not illusioned by chimeras or what is out of reach, patiently wait until the food comes to their gullet before their mouths water or the gastric juices are provoked.
