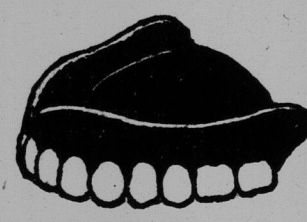

THE MUSICAL KINDERGARTEN

Miss Whitman's Pupils Gave an Enjoyable Recital on Saturday Afternoon.

Miss Whitman's Musical Kindergarten pupils gave an excellent exhibition in the Union Hall, north end, last Saturday afternoon, and it is very much to be regretted that the audience was not larger than it was as the work of the wee students merited a much better attendance. The programme opened with an interesting address by Miss Whitman, in which, at some length, she compared the old-fashioned and modern methods of imparting to the child a mind a practical knowledge of music, and pointed out to her audience that the teaching system employed today in the leading musical institutions is exactly the reverse of that practiced by the teachers of years ago. The memorizing of a number of rules and the prolonged studies of exercises before taking up even simple composition is now a thing of the past and the juvenile student of today acquires a musical education along the most practical and natural line.

At the close of the address the pupils, who have been studying only since last September, rendered the following excellent programme in a manner that would do credit to older students, and which spoke volumes for the painstaking efforts of their teacher. Opening song--"Tin Pan Guards' Parade"--by the Kindergarten. Ear training--By the Kindergarten. Piano solo--Ronald Bond--Grade II. Piano solo--Elaine Martin--Grade II. Scale exercises--By the Kindergarten. Piano solo--Joy O'Neil--Grade II. Song--"Jolly Little Raindrops"--Class. Chord playing--Class. Recitation--Victoria Bauer. Piano solos--A and B--Rosalin Waterman--Grade II. Piano solos--A and B--Bessie Duval--Grade V. Writing exercise--Class. Piano solo--Grace Ewing--Grade II. Piano duet--Louise Bond and Nina Caritte. Piano solo--Kathleen O'Neill--Grade III. Closing song--By the class.

When it is considered that none of the kindergarten pupils have as yet had a piano lesson, the results Miss Whitman has obtained are little short of miraculous. The wee tots were perfectly at ease and answered every question quickly and intelligently, a fact which goes to show that the training has been

Among the most interesting methods employed in the musical education of the little child, is the use of bright, pretty colors in teaching the various tones--each tone having a perfectly distinct color of its own. The exercises in ear-training, scales and harmony were at once interesting and instructive and those whose privilege it was to attend the recital could not but realize that the system employed by Miss Whitman was more than successful, and it would amply repay parents who intend giving their little ones a musical education to attend the recitals given by this efficient teacher.

BODY FOUND IN GRAND BAY

Body of Unknown Man Picked Up in the River Yesterday Afternoon.

Yesterday afternoon William Brittain, of this city, and W. Marks, of Grand Bay, found the body of a man floating in the St. John river at Van's cove, half a mile east of Grand Bay. Coroner Macfarland, of Fairville, was immediately notified and reached there about 6 o'clock. He found that the drowned man was about 6 feet tall and weighed about 180 pounds. He was 50 years of age and had been bald for some time before his death. There were no body marks or letters by which he could be identified. He wore a black coat with blue sweater and three shirts. His shoes were of the lumberman style and had a mowing machine section curled up at the corners and screwed tight to the heels. This is a device used by lumbermen in the woods to prevent them from slipping on icy logs and it is believed that the drowned man met his death in Maine. Seventy-three dollars and thirty-one cents were found pinned in his pocket, and it was in United States money. Coroner Macfarland said that from the condition of the body the man was likely drowned last fall. If the body is not identified it will be buried by the parish of Lancaster.
