New York, July 16—Although it would be unfair to blame Manager William Donovan for the failure of the Highlanders it is said on the best authority that he will not be retained when his contract expires in the fall.

It is understood that President Johnson of the American League will support the owners of the team when they decide to engage a new manager. Several candidates for Donovan's place have been discussed. Foremost among these candidates is Larry Doyle, former captain of the Giants, and after him two other well known baseball field marshals will be considered. Carrigan, former leader of the Red Sox and Thomas Needham, managing the Newark International League team.

**Magee Traded for Marsans.**

Cleveland, Ohio, July 15—Colonel Jacob Ruppert, owner of the Yankees, before leaving here tonight for New York, announced that the deal involving the transfer of Lee Magee to the St. Louis Browns for outfielder Armando Marsans had been completed. Word to this effect reached Colonel Ruppert from President B. B. Johnson, who has been carrying on the negotiations.

Manager Donovan tonight notified Magee of the transfer and directed him to report to the Browns at once. Marsans is expected to report to the New York Club here tomorrow. According to the terms of the agreement, the owners of the Yankees are to pay the difference between the contracts of Magee and Marsans.

The latter is signed to a \$4,000 contract, and Magee is working out the last year of a three-year contract calling for \$25,000, or about \$8,800 per season. The Yankees paid \$22,500 for Magee when the Federal League blew up, and have since paid him more than \$12,000 in salary. His work with the club has been very disappointing.

**Racing in Ireland.**

London, July 14—The stoppage of flat racing in England has taken a large number of the prominent owners, trainers and jockeys to Ireland, where the popular sport is enjoying its best season on record. Although at the time of the suspension in England an effort was made to cancel further meetings in the Emerald Isle, no interference occurred.

The stewards of the Irish Turf Club have received permission from the war cabinet to publish the following additional programme of flat race meetings: Mullingar, July 16th; Clarenorris, 17th; Limerick, 18th; Thurles, 20th; The Curragh, 24th, 25th, and 26th; Galway, Aug. 1st and 2nd, and The Curragh, Aug. 12th. Lord Carnarvon, Major Clayton, T. Davidson, W. Raphael and R. B. Thornburn are a few of the best known English owners who have registered their colors to ride in Ireland.

ship. He has issued an appeal to the American business men, which will rank as one of the great state documents of the war, in the interests of the common people. He has formally served notice on mine operators, manufacturers, and shipping interests that the United States government intends to fix the prices of their products during the war period, and that the public must receive the same service on the same basis as the government. He utters a warning to agitators and unionists to a great duty. "We must make the prices to the public the same as the prices to the government. Prices mean the same thing everywhere now. They mean the efficiency or the inefficiency of the nation, whether it is the government that pays them or not. They mean victory or defeat. They mean that America will win her place once for all among the foremost free nations of the world, or that she will sink to defeat and become a second rate power alike in thought and action. This is a day of her reckoning and every man among us must personally face that reckoning along with her."

Your patriotism is of the same self-denying stuff as the patriotism of the men dead and maimed on the fields of France, or it is no patriotism at all. Those who sought to avoid the rule-

ings of the government are warned that they would be held guilty of an act favorable to the cause of the enemy. Patriotism and profits must never be mentioned in the same breath. "No true patriot," says President Wilson, in speaking of the soldiers who are going overseas, "will permit himself to take toll of their heroism in money or seek to grow rich by the shedding of their blood. . . I shall expect every man of you who is not a slacker to be at my side throughout this great enterprise. In it, no man will win honor who thinks of himself."

Canada has need of such words as these, and such leadership as President Wilson is so splendidly giving his country. Similar notice to profiteers in Canada should have been given two or three years ago. We have suffered much in the meantime—our war energies, indeed, have been so much dissipated by the excessive prices the people have had to pay. That warning should be given now in clear and unmistakable terms. It is a tragedy that the plain people have had to endure extortion so long.

**REAL LEADERSHIP**

Nothing has been more calculated to quell the war enthusiasm of the people than the knowledge that while their sons were fighting on the battlefields of France, the war profiteers at home were piling up fortunes out of the people's agonies. That has been our sad and tragic experience in Canada. There has been no attempt, up to recent times, to deal seriously with the question of food supplies, and the cost of living. And yet nothing during the past three years has been more burdensome to the plain people of Canada.

President Wilson is not disposed to rest idly while the "price boosters" are allowed to reap a harvest out of the people's necessities. He has once more sounded the clear note of strong leader-
