

ROYAL ARCH MASON OFFICERS ELECTED

Meeting of General Grand Chapter Held in Portland, Maine

Portland, Me., Sept. 12.—Acknowledgement of fraternal greetings from Portland Council, Knights of Columbus, and selection of Denver, Colo., as the 1927 meeting place were outstanding events of the closing session today of the thirty-ninth triennial convocation of the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, at Masonic Temple.

Appearance of a large bouquet of gladioli at the general grand high priests station marked the opening of the final session. Attached was a card extending fraternal greetings of the Knights of Columbus by an immediate and unanimous vote, the gift was accepted with appreciation and general secretary Connover was instructed to convey to Portland Council hearty acknowledgments of the gift and the spirit of fraternal greetings.

It was voted to duplicate the action of the General Grand Council of Royal Arch Masons here this week in donating \$5,000 to the George Washington Masonic Memorial at Alexandria, Va.

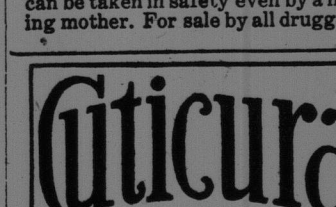
