PLANS TO BRING TOURIST TRAFFIC

Adirondacks Hotelmen Will Confer With the Montreal Organisation.

(Montreal Gazette.)

A convention of hotelmen, representing the Adirondack Resorts' Association, will be held in Montreal during the first week of February, in conjunction with the Tourist's Bureau of Montreal. The delegates from across the border will be the guests of the various hotels and merchants of this city, and special arrangements are being made for the business sessions and the entertainment of these gentlemen while they are in Montreal. Ways and means for the promotion of a larger tourist traffic to Montreal and the province of Quebec generally, the year round, will be discussed, and plans adopted to further this idea. Representatives of upwards of fifty hotels in the Adirondacks will be present. Bureaus of information for the distribution of intelligent information, making arrangements for territories with fish and game privileges; winter sports; bringing conventions to this vicinity, together with a greater tourist traffic by railroad, steamboat and motor car, are important topics for discussion at the meeting.

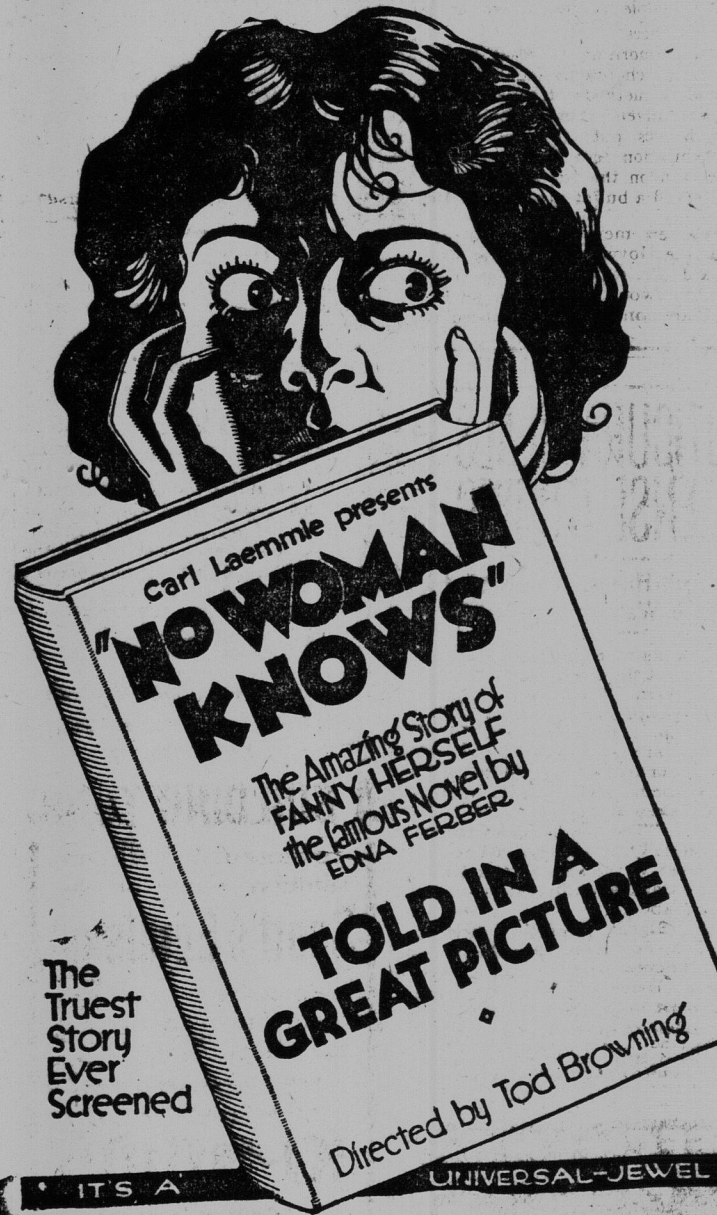
