THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

By James Bryce

From chapter 33 of volume 1 of "The American Commonwealth." NEVERTHELESS, the rigid constitution of the United States has rendered, and renders now, inestimable services. It opposes obstacles to rash and hasty change. It secures time for deliberation. It forces people to think seriously before they alter it or pardon a transgression of it. It makes legislatures and statesmen slow to over-pass their legs, and even to propose measures which the constitution seems to disapprove. It tends to render the inevitable process of modification gradual and tentative, the result of admitted and growing necessities rather than of restless impatience. It altogether prevents some changes which a temporary majority may clamor for, but which will have ceased to be demanded before the barriers interposed by the constitution have been overcome.

It does still more than this. It forms the mind and temper of the people. It trains them to habits of legality. It strengthens their conservative instincts, their sense of the value of stability and permanence in political arrangements. It makes them feel that to comprehend their supreme instrument of government is a personal duty, incumbent on each one of them. It familiarizes them with it. It attracts them by ties of pride and reverence to those fundamental principles on which the constitution is based. These are enormous services to render to any free country, but above all to one which, or special wisdom, but by public opinion, that is to say, by the ideas and feelings of the people at large. In no country were swift political changes so much to be apprehended, because nowhere has material growth been so rapid and immigration so enormous. In none might the political character of the people have seemed more likely to be bold and prone to innovation, because their national existence began with a revolution which even now lies only a century behind them. In none has ripened into a more prudently conservative temper may be largely ascribed to the influence of the famous instrument of 1789, which, enacted in and for a new republic, summed up so much of what was best in the laws and customs of an ancient monarchy.

BIRDMEN MAKE GOOD RECORDS AT AVIATION MEET

New York, Oct. 25---Despite unpleasant weather conditions in the city, the aviators met were well contented and a large crowd watched the various flights of the morning.

Up to the present time, Graham White, of England, is the best money winner. Following are the results today and the standing of the prize winners:

First hourly altitude: First, Lesseppe (Belgion), 6,381 feet; Hoxsey (Wright), second, 5,796; Johnson entered but forgot his barograph and was disqualified.

Second hourly altitude: First, Johnson (Wright), 7,303; a new American record; Hoxsey (Wright), second, 4,882; Latham (Antoinette), third, 3,772.

First hourly distance: First, Latham (Antoinette), 19 laps, penalized 50 seconds for fouling a pylon, time 54 minutes 54 seconds; Grahame-White (Farman), second, 10 laps, time 6 minutes 37.25 seconds. No third.

Second hourly distance: First, Grahame-White (Farman) and Belierio (monoplane), 19 laps, penalized 10.43 seconds; Mars (Curline), second, 13 laps, penalized two laps for fouling pylons, time 28 minutes 20.15 seconds; third, McCurdy (Curline), 12 laps, time 21 minutes 43.15 seconds.

Finalization of duration: Hoxsey (Wright) and Johnson (Wright) tied for first place in 2 hours; third, Latham (Antoinette), 1 hour 59 minutes.

Cross country: Won by Radley (Bleriot), elapsed time 19 minutes 48.25 seconds; second, Moisant (Bleriot), elapsed time 58 minutes 29 seconds; Drexel and McCurdy did not finish.

Standing of the prize winners: Grahame-White, second in first hourly altitude, \$100; second in second hourly distance, \$250; winnings today, \$300; previous winnings, \$1,200; total to date, \$1,500.

Hoxsey, second in first hourly altitude, \$100; second in second hourly altitude, \$100; half the money for first and second place in daily totalization of duration (with Johnson), \$375; winnings for the day, \$750; previous winnings, \$1,000; total to date, \$1,750.

Moisant, second in cross country race, \$250; previous winnings, \$650; total to date, \$900.

MAY SELL POULTRY BY WEIGHT

The sub-committee of the safety board appointed to look into the matter of reviving the by-law of the department, held a meeting in city hall yesterday afternoon. It was in the nature of an informal conference with the heads of the departments to ascertain their views with regard to changes which they think would be beneficial. Several more meetings are to be held before anything definite is decided upon. In connection with the movement to introduce desirable changes into the civic by-laws, strong representations are being made regarding the city produce market. Forfeiting, it is claimed, is being continually carried on much to the detriment of householders. The present by-law requiring that produce should be exposed three hours before being sold, is being considered, and it is charged, is to all intents and purposes non-existent now, and it is claimed something ought to be done to enforce it. Another matter which may receive attention as the matter in which poultry is sold to the consumer. This it is said, would be more honestly done if all birds were sold by weight.

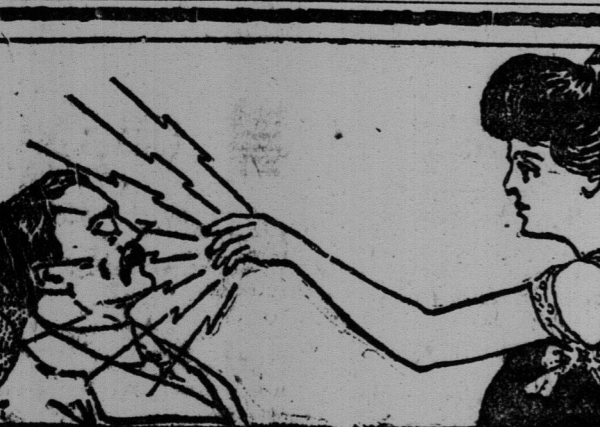
