

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS
TENDERS FOR STATION AND OTHER
BUILDINGS

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the undersigned and marked on the envelope "Tender for Station Buildings" will be received at the office of the Commissioner of the Transcontinental Railway at Ottawa, until 12 o'clock noon of the 11th day of June, 1911, for the erection of station and other buildings required along the line of the Transcontinental Railway as set forth below:

Section 1.—From Piaster Rock in the Province of New Brunswick westward to the Quebec bridge.

Section 2.—From Mile 181.8 to Mile 194 east of Quebec bridge.

Section 3.—From Mile 194 to Mile 198 east of Quebec bridge.

Section 4.—From the Quebec bridge westward to Mile 45.

Section 5.—From Mile 55 to Mile 194 west of Quebec bridge.

Section 6.—At Cochrane in the Province of Ontario.

Section 7.—From the divisional yard at Grimsby, Ontario, eastward for a distance of 60 miles.

to be solved for a family outside the city this week. According to the Italian Consul, the girl was brought to this country more than eight years ago by kidnappers, who posed as the father and uncle of the child. She was placed in a home for girls where she was reared until a year ago, when she was turned out to do domestic service.

Recently the clothes she wore when brought to the United States came into the possession of the Italian Consul in some unknown way. They were of expensive texture and indicated to him that she belonged to a noble family. His investigation disclosed the fact that she was of noble origin and had been stolen from her parents by unknown persons, who had contrived to escape from Italy through the collusion of steamship employees.

Until he has received official permission from the Italian authorities, the consul has declined to give the name of the noble family to whom the girl belongs. On the same day Mrs. Ada A. Rudy had Professor Rudy, her husband, on the coast. She asks for a separation and alimony, claiming that the pedagogy was more interested in a mysterious French woman, known only as Zaida. In her affidavit to the court, the wife says she married on naming their only daughter after this woman, and that he replaced her portrait in a frame in his room with that of the French woman.


Professors in Trouble
Professor Harry Thurston Peck, for many years holder of the chair of English Literature at Columbia University, shared the interest of the courts this week with Professor R. C. Kelly, tutor of languages at the College of the City of New York. Professor Peck, it will be recalled, was once again accused by Esther Quinlan, a newspaper writer, for breach of promise. Subsequently he was dismissed from the university because of the disagreeable notoriety caused by the suit. Now he is suing Professor Nicholas Murray Butler, president of the university, for damages for defamation of character in connection with his dismissal.

In the Supreme Court, Professor Peck, who has announced his intention of fighting the breach of promise suit, has been asked through counsel to have the action dismissed on the ground that the attorney for Mrs. Quinlan had not placed the case on the calendar or made any move to have it brought to trial. Decision was rendered in favor of the professor.

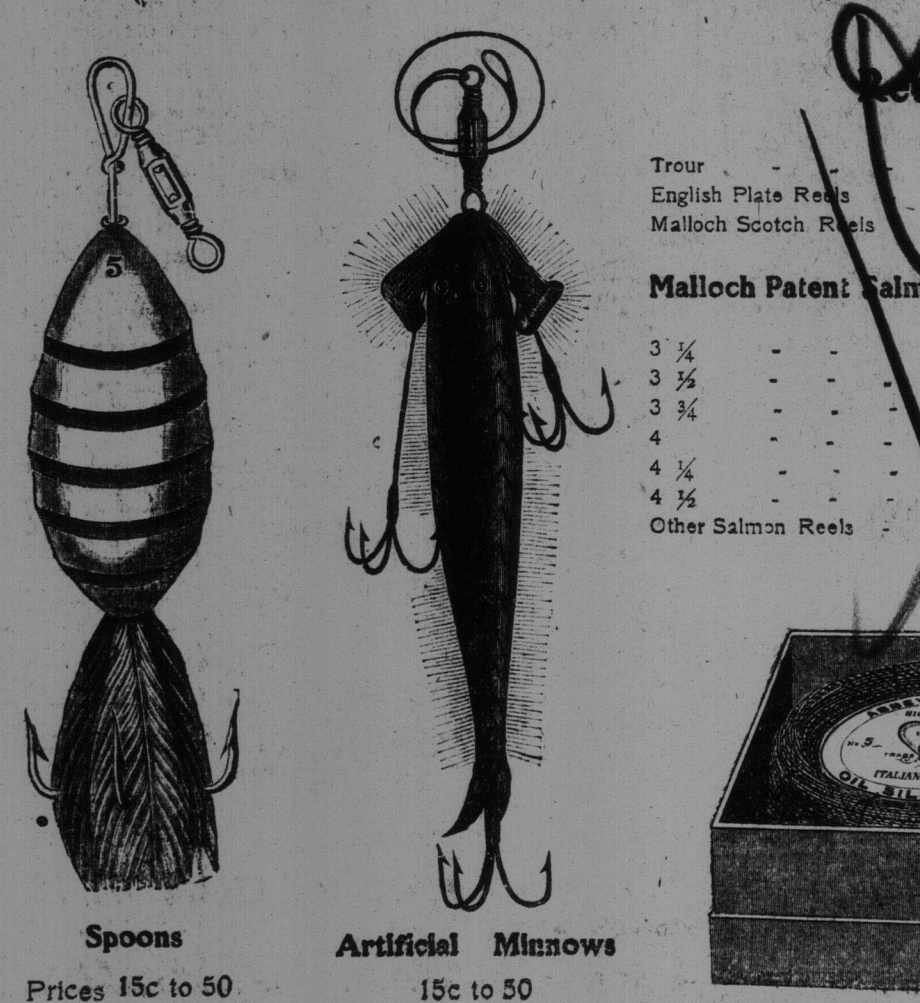

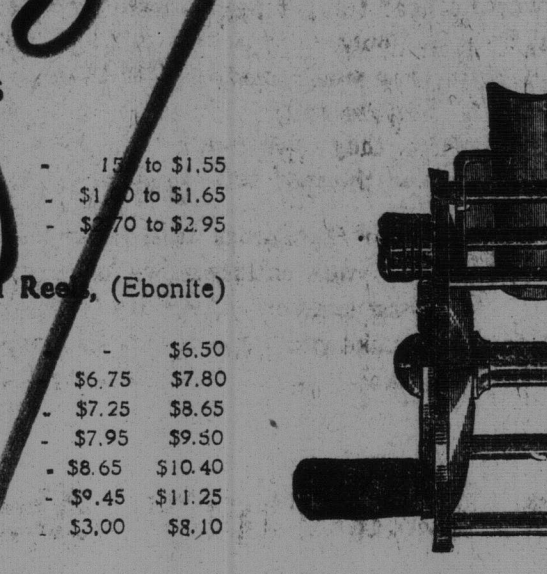

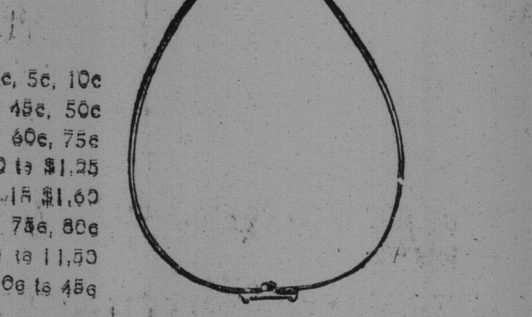
