## TAKES MAD JUMP WITH DAUGHTER

Mother of 29 With Daughter of Seven Jumps Through Window—Charged With Felonious Assault.

New York, Feb. 8.—Mrs. Louise Figue, 29 years of age, who with her husband, Thomas, and their seven-year-old daughter, Louise, occupy rooms on the second floor of the apartment house at Long Island City, suddenly picked up her daughter and raising her in the air, jumped through the window and landed on the sidewalk. Both struck on the concrete sidewalk in the courtyard and their moans were heard by Mrs. Thomas O'Neil, the janitor. She called the police and the woman and her daughter were taken to St. John's Hospital, Long Island City. It was said last night that both probably would recover, although Mrs. Figue had been badly injured. Her husband was another part of the apartment at the time and did not know of the matter until a neighbor told him what had occurred. He informed the police that his wife had been acting strangely recently, and he was of the opinion that her mind gave way. Mrs. Figue is charged with felonious assault and is under guard at the hospital.

## NO CONSECRATION OF BISHOP THERE

Official Says a Public Ceremony Prohibited by Law in Mexico.

Mexico City, Feb. 8.—(Associated Press).—The consecration of Mr. Jose Manrique Zarate as Bishop of Huasteca which was to have taken place at Cerro del Cubilete, where ceremonies recently held culminated in the expulsion from the country of Mr. Filippi, the Papal delegate, was forbidden on Saturday by Gilberto Valenzuela, sub-secretary of the Interior, in instructions forwarded to Governor Antonio Madrazo de Cuanahuato, according to El Universal and El Democrata. Senor Valenzuela cited lengthy sections of the constitution prohibiting such public ceremonies and the construction of religious edifices. He reiterated that the Government did not wish to appear prejudiced against Catholics, but that it must act in accordance with the Federal laws. El Heraldo, which is recognized as the Government organ, announces that legal proceedings against members of the Catholic clergy participating in the ceremonies which led to the expulsion of Mr. Filippi have been dropped. "The investigation proving that certain civilians, and not priests, provoked the conflict between the priests and the Federal authorities." The newspaper adds that it now appears that high Catholic prelates in Mexico are almost unanimously in accord on the expulsion of Mr. Filippi, since the suble ceremonies were conceived, presided over and made possible by the apostolic delegate personally.

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## IRISH TROOPS ON WRECKED STEAMER ARE ALL SAVED

Queenstown, Feb. 8.—Troops carried by the Free State Government steamer, Hibernia, which struck the rocks twelve miles southeast of this port yesterday, have been landed by small boats at Ballycotton.

The vessel, a patrol boat, is so badly damaged that she still remains where she struck. The crew was also taken off.

EXPLAINS PLANS OF \$1,600,000 TERMINAL  
Plant at South Portland Calls for 27 Miles of Trackage.

Portland, Me., Feb. 8.—An adjourned session of a hearing before the public utilities commission on the petition of the Portland Terminal Company to take over land in South Portland for the building of a \$1,600,000 freight terminal has been concluded. Attorneys for the road and for protesting land owners were given 10 days in which to file briefs.

Plans of the road were outlined by Bertrand T. Wheeler, chief engineer. He explained that the proposed development plans called for 27 miles of trackage, capable of handling nearly 1,500 freight cars, 40-stall roundhouses, coal pockets of 200,000 tons capacity, two 75,000-gallon steel oil tanks, and various shops and office buildings. The new terminal would enable the company to handle three times as much freight as at the present time.

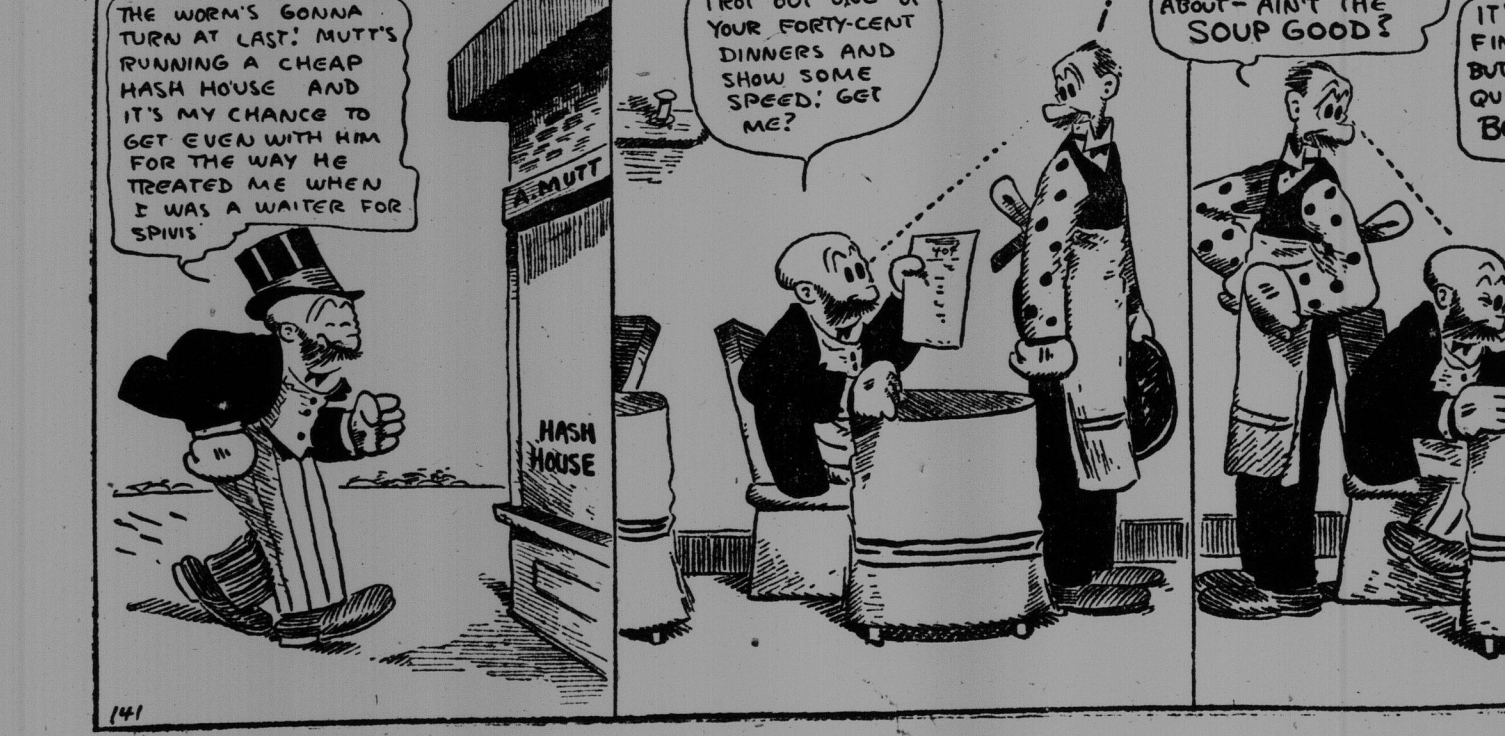
