one might judge from the sun-tinted faces, the boys are much addicted."

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A very handsome and appropriate addition to the "Speech-room" has lately been made by the Old Boys' Association, and consists of a series of oak panels upon which, in letters of gold, are recorded the names of the Head Boys of the School, the Bronze Medallists, and those who have obtained Honours and Scholarships at Trinity University and elsewhere.

The Infirmary, a comfortable two-storeyed brick building, is situated about a quarter of a mile from the School premises. It is in charge of an experienced nurse who is ready to receive a patient at any time. Boys who are attacked by any infectious disorder are at once removed to the Infirmary and kept there under the Doctor's supervision until all danger of spreading the disease is over. For ordinary ailments there is a suite of rooms adjoining the Matron's apartments, where the patients are secluded from the rest of the School, and receive whatever attention their cases may require.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the session of 1871-72, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor, the Provost, and the Professors in Arts of the University of Trinity College, the Head Master of the School, and such other persons as may, from time to time, be appointed by the Governing Body.
