Better Than The Best

Trade Figures for Fiscal Year Ending June Make Pleasant Reading.

Increase of \$13,000,000 Compared With the Previous Twelve Months.

Ottawa, July 22.—The customs department today prepared a statement of trade figures for the fiscal year ending June 30th last. They show that the aggregate trade of the Dominion for the year is \$394,000,000, an increase of \$13,000,000 over the same time last year, and last year was the greatest in the history of the country.
