C. K. BECKWITH DEAD. Was President of Bank Which Made Loans to Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick,

Oberlin, Ohio, Feb. 5.-C. K. Beckwith, president of the defunct Cirizens' National Bank, of this city, died at 10.45 o'clock to-night, after two days of unconsciousness, during which death was expected at any moment. Only the family surrounded the deathbed of the banker. Mr. Beckwith was about 65 years old. On December 14th last the federal grand jury in Cleveland returned five indictments against Beckwith upon the charge of violating the national banking laws in connection with the loans made to Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick by the Citizens' National Bank, of Oberlin, of which deceased was the president. From the day of his arrest Mr. Beckwith's health rapidly failed as a result of worry over his his illness that he wanted to die. For several days prior to his death he fused to take food in any form. Death

resulted directly from heart trouble.
