OLD SMOKESTACKS. An Article For Which There Is Always

Secondhand stacks may be used with various temporary plants set up by con-tractors and others. A smokestack may be blown down in a windstorm and the

A steel or iron stack costs about half iron stack costs about balf as much as a new one. Stacks of metal are made no usually of steel. The steel used cos now less than wrought iron. There is an increasing use of steel instead of brick stacks. Steel stacks up to 6 and 7 feet in diameter would be classed as pertable stacks; larger stacks would be of more or less permanent character Steel smokestacks are now made up to 18 feet in diameter. Very large smoke-stacks may be lined with brick.

Secondhand smokestacks up to 2 feet stock in the yard of the dealer in second-hand beilers and machinery, and he is likely to have stacks of larger sizes elsewhere. There is always a demand for secondhand smokestacks.—New York
