Artillery Inspection is to Take Place Next Week, Beginning on

Tuesday Evening.

On Saturday of next week the St. John militiamen who are to take part in the tencentenary celebration will leave for Quebec. The annual inspection of the artillery will take place here on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings of next week and will be conducted by Col. Benson, commandant of the R. S. A. at Quebec. On Tuesday evening there will be muster parade and infantry drill. On Wednesday evening the batteries will be inspected in gundrill, and both direct and indirect firing. On Thursday evening the officers and non-commissioned officers will-be put through their examinations.
