LIGHTNING FIGHT SATURDAY BETWEEN PAPKE AND KELLY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 15.—Billy Papke won a lightning victory from Hugo Kelly in the first round this afternoon. Papke followed Kelly round the ring till they came to close quarters, both sparring carefully. Kelly swung short-arm left and rights, trying for Papke's head, one left landing hard on the jaw. Papke landed both hands on Kelly's head and the fight was all over. They were two terrific wallopers and Kelly lay still for the count. Time was called at 2.45 p. m. Papke forced Kelly against the ropes and the latter, after missing a right swing, hooked his right to the stomach. They worked to close range, both fighting carefully. At close quarters Kelly sent short-arm left and rights to the head. Papke forced Kelly to the ropes, swung his right and left arms to the jaw and with a hard right to the jaw put Kelly to the floor for the count of nine.
