## MARINE NOTES OF THE WORLD

### C. P. R. LINE.

The C. P. R. steamer Lake Manitoba, from Liverpool, October 22nd, is due at Quebec Saturday at 5.30 p. m.

### STMR. LANDOWNE REPAIRS.

The government steamer Landowne was placed on the blocks yesterday for repairs.

### THE FURNES LINE.

The Furnes Line steamer Kanawha, Capt. Kellman, arrived yesterday from London via Halifax with a large general cargo.

### STMR. OCAMO SAILS.

The West India Line steamer Ocamo, Capt. Coffin, sailed yesterday for West Indies via Halifax, with general cargo.

### SCHOONER SOLD.

The schooner Lillian Blauvelt has been sold to Jones Brothers, of Weymouth, for the sum of \$7,000, and her port of registration will be changed to Barbados.

### A LONG PASSAGE.

The three masted schooner Catherine, Capt. Wilkie, arrived at Digby Tuesday night last after taking the best part of a month on a voyage from Bangor. Bad weather was the cause.

### WEST INDIA SERVICE.

Messrs. William Thomson & Company, agents of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, announce that the steamer Cohasset, first sailing, will leave St. John November 23rd, and Halifax, December 5th.

### WHITE STAR LINE.

The White Star Dominion Line steamer Megantic was five hundred and sixty miles east of Cape Race at nine o'clock Wednesday morning, and is due at Quebec Saturday night and at Montreal Sunday afternoon.

### DANGERS TO NAVIGATION.

(Reported to the Hydrographic Office, New York.)  
Strm Itasca reported Oct. 26, about 2 miles southwest of south of Fire Island and Lightship, saw a heel of a large lumbermast about 40 feet long.

Star Strathleven (Br), reports Oct. 8, lat 24 32 N, lon 82 32 W, saw a large number of logs, varying in size.

### FROM BARBADOS.

Schooner Adriatic, Captain Wambach, arrived yesterday from Barbados with a cargo of 485 packages of molasses for Percy B. Evans. The first seven days out the schooner made practically half of the passage, after which the Adriatic encountered strong head gales and huge seas, which lengthened the passage to 26 days.

### CANADIAN NORTHERN LINE.

The Canadian Northern Line steamer Royal Edward leaves Quebec on Saturday on her last sailing from the St. Lawrence this season. Leaving Bristol on Nov. 19, she will come to Halifax, and returning will leave Halifax Dec. 3. The Royal George makes her last sailing from Quebec Nov. 15, and sails from Bristol, Dec. 3, for Halifax.

### TRAVELLING SOME.

The term schooner Laura, Captain Decker, arrived at Halifax on Tuesday from Philadelphia. This vessel was in Halifax last June when she brought up a cargo of molasses from Barbados. Since then she has covered the route from Bridgewater to Barbados, then to Russia, and the coast of Honduras, where she loaded coconuts for Philadelphia.

### SCHOONER DAMAGED.

Boston, Oct. 30.—The schooner Hat, of St. John, bound for New Bedford, rammed the schooner William H. Clifford, which was at anchor in Vineyard Haven Sound. The St. John boat was filled with wood; both vessels were badly damaged.

The Clifford was able to proceed, but a few hours later was again in collision, the last time with the schooner Margaret Haskell. The Haskell, in turn, a few hours later, was bumped into by the schooner Hudson, which was badly damaged. The Hudson is an unlucky boat and has been in many wrecks.

### YESTERDAY CREW OF SCHOONER LOTTIE BEARD, WHO ABANDONED SCHOONER OCT. 16, LANDED IN ENGLAND.

The Lizard, Eng., Oct. 30.—The crew of the American schooner Lottie Beard was landed here today from the British tank steamer Sylvia, Capt. Kendall of the Lottie Beard, and his men having abandoned their vessel on October 16th. Capt. Prouse of the steamer Sylvia, which left Port Arthur, Texas, on October 6th, by way of Newport News, for Gloucester, England, picked up the shipwrecked crew, who had been compelled to abandon the Lottie Beard, while that vessel was making the voyage from New York to Augusta, Maine. The Lottie Beard was built at Fair Haven, Mass., in 1866. She sailed from the port of New Bedford, and was owned by Mr. O. E. Kendall. Her displacement was 288 tons.

## BANK CLEARINGS IN CANADIAN CENTRES

### Montreal.

Montreal, Oct. 30.—Montreal bank clearings for the week ending today were \$59,538,078, an increase of \$5,818,000 over the corresponding period of last year. Clearings for the corresponding week in 1911 were \$41,328,255.

### Toronto.

Toronto, Oct. 30.—The clearings of banks in Toronto for the week with comparisons, were as follows:  
Week ending October 30, (six days), \$4,952,783, last week (five days), \$4,019,561. Corresponding week, 1912 (five days), \$3,719,578. Corresponding week, 1911, (five days), \$3,659,253.

### Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Oct. 30.—Bank clearings for the week ending today amounted to \$4,829,046, as compared with \$3,498,530 for the corresponding week last year and \$3,618,331 for the same week of 1911.

The tremendous wheat movement through Winnipeg again reflected in this week's bank clearings, which show an increase of over ten millions compared with a year ago and over thirteen millions over 1911.

### Ottawa.

Ottawa, Oct. 30.—Bank clearings for the week ending October 30, \$4,141,263, as compared with \$3,299,878 for the same week in 1912.

### Quebec.

Quebec, Oct. 30.—Bank clearings for the week ending October 30, \$2,935,727.

### London.

London, Ont., Oct. 30.—Bank clearings for the week ended today show an increase of \$16,157 over the same week for last year. For the week concluded Wednesday, the clearings were \$1,753,404 while the same week for last year shows \$1,343,217.

The clearings for the week are \$1,771,446, as compared with \$1,475,817 for the same week last year.

### Halifax.

Halifax, Oct. 30.—The Halifax bank clearings for the week were \$1,952,757.92, and for the same week last year, \$1,654,378.82.
