SPRACKLIN IS ACQUITTED OF THE SHOOTING

Verdict in No Way a Surprise to the Crowd Following the Trial.

JURY WAS OUT ALMOST AN HOUR

Situation Very Tense When Pastor - Inspector is Pronounced Not Guilty.

Windsor, Ont., Feb. 24—After de liberating for exactly lifty-five minuted at the conclusion of two days and a half of a trial that made Canadian legal history, the jury at the Sandwick assizes brought in a verdict of "new guilty" in the case of Rev. J. O. I. Spracklin, pastor of Sandwich Method ist church, accused of "unlawfully slaping and killing one Beverly Trumble. After being addressed by the coursel in the case and charged by Chie Justice Sir William Mulock, presiding justice, the jury left the court room at 2.30. Exactly, at 3.15 they returned to the court room and made public the verdict that made the accused minister a free man.
