Fries Atcheson, an old resident of Elizabethtown, died at his residence on Monday morning, the 13th inst. Mr. Atcheson was a bachelor, his sister, a maiden lady, being his house-keeper. He was reputed to be one of the wealthiest men in the township.

Mr. J. B. Saunders shipped 400 cheese boxes over the B. & W. to Ogdensburg, yesterday. Although Mr. Saunders has a large quantity to fill orders as fast as they are received. This is not to be wondered at, for he makes a superior article and sells at a reasonable price.

Some people wonder why accounts of births, marriages, or deaths, do not occur in the neighborhood are not found in the paper. It is simply because they are not sent in. Newspaper reporters are expected to pick up all the news they can, but they cannot be expected to invade or tempt around people's private houses or sleeping apartments for such items.

Mr. S. B. Williams, the station agent here, informs us that a train west of the B. & W. Railroad will leave Westport on Thursday morning next at 7 a.m. calling at all stations along the line, reaching Farmersville about 10 a.m., arriving in Brockville at 12 noon. Returning, will leave Brockville on Friday morning and run through to Westport. On Saturday morning the train will leave Westport at 7 a.m. and take on all the cheese delivered at the stations along the line. A passenger coach will be attached to all trains for the convenience of passengers.

Mr. and Mrs. Munroe, who keep the tollgate between Elm Mills and Unionville, had a pleasant surprise one day last week. Mrs. Egan, a sister of Mr. Munroe's, whom he had not seen for twenty-three years, came down from her home in Western Ontario, on a visit, surprising the old couple by stopping in upon them unannounced.

Of the large family of Munroe's who once lived in this section, the old gentleman above referred to is the only one now living in the county of Leeds.

While he was relating the circumstances of his sister's visit, and giving the present residence, as far as known, of his remaining brothers and sisters, we were forcibly reminded of those beautiful lines by Mrs. Hemans, which we translate as follows, to suit the present case:

They grew in country side by side. They reared up, tall and wide. But now they stand far and wide. Alone many different sides. As mothers' milk they were fed. As sisters' love they were led. Where are those young ones now? Yesterdays' children, how they grow!

Yesterday afternoon, Constable G. W. Brown received a warrant for the arrest of Robt. Barber, a dangerous lunatic, of Rockspring, Elizabethtown. Thinking from reports received that he would require assistance, Brown got Constable H. C. Phillips to accompany him, and the two easily made the arrest.

This morning the prisoner was brought before Justice Scovill, Wilkie and Lovatt, and evidence was taken as to his condition. Wm. Barber deposed that prisoner was 27 years of age, and had been of unsound mind six or seven years. He married two years ago, but his wife left him two years after, on account of his violent actions. Prisoner became violent about a month ago, and had threatened to take his own life and the lives of others. He had been very irascible and temperate before symptoms of insanity appeared. Prisoner had admitted shooting and killing a colt belonging to S. Tackberry, and also the shooting of colts belonging to Wm. Stewart and John Hicks, which were not killed outright. Samuel Tackberry testified that he had had a colt killed, and believed the prisoner did the deed. Justice Wright here asked prisoner if he killed Tackberry's colt. He admitted having done so, but declined saying anything more about it.

The Court committed Barber to a dangerous lunatic, and Constable Brown conveyed him to Brockville this afternoon.

The recent destructive fire at Biplow, Ont., furnishes another proof that our small country villages are criminally negligent in the matter of fire protection. The village of Ripley was, from all accounts, about the same size as Brockville, and had a fire company of five or six engines, which is simply none at all. During the fire of the 13th inst., a fire started in the rear premises of a hardware store, and although there were hundreds of willing hands to use the few wooden pails which formed the only weapons available for fighting the flames, the fire soon became unmanageable, and in a few hours the business portion of the town was in ruins. Nearly seventy thousand dollars worth of property was destroyed, which was partially covered by insurance—but only sufficient to provide for about half the loss sustained. Our citizens are sleep- ing in their beds, and are not starting them from their lethargy, and cause them to realize when too late that they have been negligent in providing the means for extinguishing fires. If we even had a well organized fire company, we would have a fire engine, and a fire engine, properly equipped, its services would be found of great value in case of the breaking out of a fire. The cost of an outfit would be comparatively slight, and could be borne equally by all our citizens. Let a move be made towards securing so desirable a boon at once.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS. Fifty-one candidates wrote at the entrance examinations at Farmersville. The local examiners, Mr. M. M. Fenwick, B. A., and P. S. I. Kenny, M. D., passed seven and recommended one more, making the number of the book twelve pupils being admitted to the preparatory much higher than usual, which accounts for the small proportion of successful candidates. Fourteen pupils from the Farmersville public school went up, of whom the large number of ten were from the preparatory and their indubitable headmaster, Mr. Porter, may justly be proud of. THE CHEESE MARKETS. Brockville Daily Journal's Board of Trade. Brockville, July 12.—The meeting to-day was held upon as being one of the most important of the season, as nearly half of the June make of cheese was yet in first hands. Nearly every member present manifested a willingness to put out on a 10c market. This, of course, did not meet with the approval of the buyers, who claimed that 9c. was as much money as should be paid, and offered to take nearly 5000 boxes of goods at the figure for ruling price. Some 15,000 boxes were offered by regular members, and about 3,000 boxes by non-members, of which, by 10:30 p.m., some 4,000 boxes, including 2,000 boxes were sold, at from 9 1/2c to 9 3/4c, with 9c. for ruling price. It was evident to many that the representatives of large dealers were trying to block business, which made the market the most unsatisfactory one of the season. Liverpool cable came 6d. stronger, at 47s. A year ago Liverpool was 45c. 6d., with price here at 9c. to 9 1/2c. On Ogdensburg, was 9 1/2c. to 9 1/4c., and Canton 9c. to 9 1/2c.

OGDENBURG AND CANTON MARKETS. OGDENBURG, N. Y., July 14.—Thirty-three factories offered 3,800 boxes. Sales were 1,725 at 9 1/2c. The market was firm. At Canton 4,000 boxes were offered, of which 600 sold at 9 1/2c., 1,350 at 9c., and 200 at 9 1/4c. A week ago Ogdensburg went at 9 1/2c. to 9 3/4c., with price here at 9c. to 9 1/2c. 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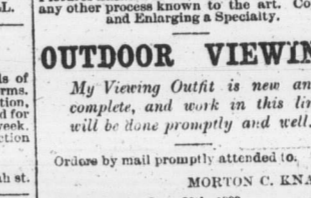
